New York Charges Conspiracy Against Ban Johnson and Five Clubs.

New York, Dec. 19.—Injunction proceedings against President Ban Johnson by the New York Yankees were proceeded with today.

## PROS. NOT REINSTATED BY OTTAWA AMATEUR ATHLETIC FEDERATION

Concerning the statements which have recently appeared in the press with reference to the reported action by the Ottawa Amateur Athletic Federation in reinstating professional athletes, Secretary Norton H. Crow of the Amateur Athletic Federation has issued a statement, in which he stated that the Ottawa officials, has just received emphatic denials of the reported action.

The Ottawa officials state that there is no light on to secure control of hockey in this territory, which at the recent annual meeting of the Amateur Athletic Union was allotted to the jurisdiction of the A. A. F.
