# UPPER CANADA TRACT SOCIETY. Proceedings at the Sixty-Fifth Annual Meeting Last Evening-Review of

Meeting Last Evening-Eview of the Year's Work, Last night about one hundred persons as-sembled in Jarvis-street Baptist Church at the sixty-fifth annual meeting of the above society. The president, J, K. Macdonald, occupied the chair, and on the platform were: Kev. Dr. Thomas, Kev. John Kay, Rev. Dr. Robinson, Rev. Dr. Moffatt and others

The secretary's report showed a wide and varied range of work done, for the most part with great success. The work undertaken embraced religious tracts, book and Bible distribution, missionary colport-age work, lumber camp and sallors' mis-sions, and Cainese colportage work. The missionariles of this society in Ontario and Manitoba during the last year traveled 13, 015 miles, visited 19,500 families, sold 2875 Bibles and Testaments, and also 19,825 vol-umes of the best religious books. Resolutions of thanks for God's blessing upon the society, of recommendation of the work to the sympathy and support of the church, and of thanks to the officers were moved and carried. Rev. Dr. Robin-son, Rev. Drs. Moffatt and Messrs. J. J. Woodhouse, J. S. Potter, J. Knowles, Jr., and E. J. Joseiln spoke briefly to the motions.


