THE PACIFIC CABLE. London, April 13 .- The Times, conluding a column article on the subject of the Pacific cable, says if Britain is to hold the field, decisive action should be inaugurated without delay.

TROUBLE IN COREA. Yokohama, April 13.-There have been fresh uprisings in the provinces of Corea, and changes have been made in the cabinet. M. Speyer, the Russian charge d'affaires at Seoul, and M. Kuril Aliexoff, late Russian representative in the Corean department of customs, have left the country for China. CONSPIRACY AGAINST LI HUNG CHANG.

April 13.-The Shanghaf Shanghai, Star says that a conspiracy has been discovered in the palace at Pekin to assassinate Li Hung Chang and other high officials. They are charged with selling China to Russia There is great disquietude in the Yang Tse Valley and the northern provinces.

SALE OF OCEAN STEAMERS. London, April 13.-The Berlin correspondent of the Daily News says the Columbia and Normannia have been purchased for Spain. A special dispatch from Hamburg says that a London firm has purchased the Columbia and Normannia, of the Hamburg-American line, and the Spree and Saale, of the North German Lloyd line, for 9,000,000 marks. Accounts are conflicting, according to the dispatch, as to the real destination of all; but it is believed that the Columbia and the Normannia have been resold to the United States.

That the president of the United States be, and he herebly is, directed and empowered to use the entire land and naval forces of the United States and to call into the actual service of the United States the militia of the several states, to such extent as may be necessary to carry these resolu-

The committee report as it was read in the senate made a deep impression. is regarded as a powerful, almost bitter, arraignment of Spain. At the conclusion of the reading of the report Mr. Foraker (Ohio) was recognized.

R. operating expenses, \$560,000, or a total of \$1,166,000. To make the comparison a fair one, this amount should be deducted from Mr. Fielding's estimates, leaving the net amount \$37,959,000, or about \$4,000,000 less than Mr. Foster's estimates, the last year the Conservatives were in office.
