Their Resignation Accepted.

Seven Members of the King Street Official Board Step Out.

Adjourned Meeting of the King Street Presbyterian Church last evening. Officers Elected—Some Lively Discussion.

A large gathering assembled in the King Street Presbyterian Church last evening, it being the adjourned meeting to further consider the resignation of their pastor, Rev. Thomas Wilson.

The Presbyterian meeting at St. Thomas today will act on the matter. After devotional exercises, Rev. J. G. Stuart, stated the object of the meeting, and said that he wished peace and harmony to characterize all proceedings.

Some time ago, at a session of the board and representatives of different Presbyterian churches, both the session and board of managers agreed to resign in a body, believing this to be for the good of the church. Since then, however, another plan has been suggested, and Rev. J. G. Stuart briefly outlined the fact of the matter.

Mr. Stuart said it is impossible for the session to resign to the congregation. Then it was felt that there was an easier way to say we have a proposal, which, if it meets with your approval, may satisfactorily settle the difficulty. Two of the managers and two of the board of managers have agreed to resign. They have undertaken to make a sacrifice for the furthering of God's work and the prosperity of the church. I advise you strongly to accept the situation, and recognize the sacrifice that is being made to attain the desired end.

The secretary of the meeting, Mr. Stuart, also announced that he had received three other resignations from the board of managers—Mr. Thomas Black, Mr. J. E. Eady, and Wm. Reid, Messrs. W. G. It would be hardly fair to get men to make such a sacrifice, when the congregation were in the dark as to the reason.

"This congregation would suffer a greater loss by the removal of Mr. Wilson than by the destruction of the edifice by fire," said Mr. Connor in closing the discussion.

The acceptance of the resignations followed, and Messrs. P. H. Jones, S. C. Jones, and D. Forsythe, representatives of the session, were appointed a committee to make nominations. The following were named and were accepted unanimously: Mr. D. Potter, for one year; Messrs. N. McLeod and Thomas Link, for two years; and Messrs. John Henderson and D. Forsythe, for three years.

Judges Appointed.

Who Will Award Prizes at the Western Fair.

Meeting of the Cattle, Sheep and Swine Committee—Important Changes in the Rules of the Department.

The cattle, sheep and swine committee of the Western Fair board have appointed the following judges for the annual exhibition in September:

Cattle—Durham (fat and grade)—James Smith, Paris; reserve, James Hunter, of Alma, Jersey—John Davidson, of Monroe, Mich.; reserve, Prof. Day, of the Agricultural College, Guelph. Yorkshire—John H. Douglas, M.P.P., Warkworth; reserve, Alex. Humes, Burnbrae, Guernsey—J. Y. Ormsby, of Woodstock. Holsteins—J. Pollard, of Castile, Hereford, Polled Angus and Galloways—Hiram Raw Smith, Paris.

Sheep—Shropshire—Robert Millar, of some; reserve, G. Everett, Mount Vernon, Oxford and Dorset—R. G. B. Verdon, Southdowns, Hampshire and Suffolk—W. Martin, Blinbrook, reserve, W. Beattie, Wilton Grove, Leicester—W. McIntosh, of Burgoyne; reserve, W. Nichol, Plattville, Lincoln—John Geary, London; reserve, W. G. Laidlaw, Wilton Grove, Cotswolds—W. G. Laidlaw, Wilton Grove.

Swine—Yorkshire, Chester Whites, Tamworths and Suffolks—Wm. Jones, of Zanda, Poland Chinas, Berkshires, Duroc Jerseys and Essex—Thomas Readable, Concord.

Several changes in the regulations were made. The rule relating to dairy purses was altered by making it compulsory to have the milking done not earlier than 7 o'clock in the evening preceding the day of judging, instead of 4 o'clock on the morning of judging day.

The time for closing entries for cattle, sheep and swine was fixed for Wednesday preceding the opening of the fair, instead of Thursday. A special effort will be made to make the parade of prize cattle a greater attraction than ever. On behalf of the fair board, Col. Gartshore, the president, said that in cases where exhibitors needed extra help to bring out their prize-winners he would be furnished by the board.

It was asked that a second prize should be added to each class for boars and sows, two years and over. There are now seven classes, and as the prize would mean an additional expenditure of \$25 in prizes, with practically no increase in the entrance fees, the committee could not see its way clear to comply.

It was decided to award only its first and second prizes in any section where there is only one exhibitor.

The local pork packers asked the committee to open a class for "singers." Secretary Browne was instructed to notify the packers that if they would

offer prizes the board would augment the amount.

Mr. Richard Gibson, of Delaware, gave notice that he would move at the annual meeting that the prizes in the cattle department should be "pooled" and awarded according to the number of entries in each class.
