# IN SALE OF NIAGARA POWER

Charter Sought By the Hamilton Radial Company Is Pregnant With Fright for City Fathers, Who Scent Danger in One Clause.

### FRANCHISE MEANS MUCH TO THE CITY OF LONDON

Major Beattie, M. P., Wired To Have the Bill Held Up at Ottawa Until Council Sees Where It Is At-Matter Was Not Deemed Important at First.

The city fathers have just awakened to the fact that there is a great probability that they may have competition for the municipal distributing plant, and that the competitor is liable to be an extremely dangerous one. Some time ago a notice was served on the city council to the effect that several amendments to the bill of the Hamilton radial railway were being proposed, and that the company would acquire the franchise of the Windsor, Chatham and London Electric Railway.

These mere statements of fact did not impress the city fathers very seriously, and the matter was left in abeyance.

#### INVESTIGATION BEGUN.

Not long ago the city solicitor and Ald. Beattie began to investigate the charters of the Hamilton Radial and the Windsor and London line, and it was discovered that the charter allowed the company to distribute and sell tts surplus power.

The charter also gave the company the right to enter cities without their

Last year the bill came up, but was opposed on the ground that a city should not be entered without the consent of such city, expressed by bylaw. The cities of Toronto and Hamilton were chiefly interested in this clause,

and the bill was amended to suit them. The bill comes up in the House tomorrow. Mayor Stevely got word of this from City Solicitor Meredith, and he immediately consulted with Ald. Beattie, chairman of No. 1 committee.

All were of the opinion that it was too late to enter an objection to the

There was no time to send representatives to Ottawa, to make a pro-

It was also felt that there was not enough knowledge concerning the matter at present.

#### WANT BILL DELAYED.

A delay will be sought Mayor Stevely wired to Ottawa to find out exactly when the bill would come up, and asked Major Beattie, the member for London, to ask for a postponement

The wire was sent at noon today In case a postponement is granted, the city will send representatives to Ottawa to protest against the passage of the bill.

#### WHAT IT MEANS. The cardinal feature of the legislation is this:

The Hamilton Radial has a charter somewhat similar to that granted to the Windsor and London Railroad.

It has connection with the large power generators at the Falls. The charter gives the company the right to run as far as London

Here the company will connect with the Windsor and London Company, and also farther up the country, with the Lake Shore, Essex and Windsor

This will give the company a line from the Falls right through to Windsor, and another line to Sarnia

#### MAY SELL NIAGARA POWER.

The charter will give the company the right to distribute Niagara power In direct competition with the hydro-electric commission in its own terri-

Toronto and Hamilton have raised no objections to the bill, as their

rights regarding the streets have been protected. The other municipalities have not protested, and so far as can be learned

not one of them have raised any objection to the passing of the bill.

#### A DIRECT COMPETITOR.

If it goes through, London will have a direct competitor in a company distributing Niagara power.

The amendment suggested by Toronto and Hamilton, that the company be not allowed to enter the city over the city streets, except by the consent of the people by bylaw, is regarded as satisfactory in some quarters, but it does not by any means keep the company out of the city. It still has the right to enter the city by private right of way and sell

power to whoever it pleases. For instance, it could enter the city with its wires over the right of way

of the Southwestern Traction Company, if that company would consent to it. Or else, it could enter the city by a private right of way of its own. All the city can do is prevent the company coming into the city over

The city would have to sell power cheaper than the company could sell It in order to get the customers.

INTERESTING BILL. "It is rather an interesting bill." declared Ald. Beattie this morning. "We did not think of the distributing powers granted to the company, but we now see that it is the most serious part of the business. If the bill goes through, we will have a direct competitor to our own distributing plant, and we could not prevent it. Of course, the bill will be amended, preventing the company entering the city over the city streets, but it can come in over a private right of way, and we cannot prevent it. London cannot do much

SOLICITOR INSTRUCTED. "I have instructed City Solicitor Meredith to do what he thinks best in the interests of the citizens," said Mayor Stevely. "As soon as I saw what it meant, I instructed him to find out all about the matter. It is rather late, I will admit, but if the bill is postponed, as I hope it-will be, I will send Mr. Meredith and one or two aldermen to Ottawa to lay the matter before the
