Question—if one makes application for exemption on the grounds of farm service, can one's employer or father appear for him at the tribunal to state the case, and would notice of such intention have to be given beforehand? A. R. B. Answer—If the tribunal wishes proof of the facts upon which exemption is claimed it can notify the father or employer to submit evidence in writing, or ployer to submit evidence in writing, or appear in person, if necessary. Otherwise they would not appear, and it is, in fact, expected that many of the claims will be dealt with entirely in writing, without anyone appearing in person. Do not give any such notice,

Question—1. Can a young man who has not yet been examined, be examined by any military medical board? 2, if not, must he go to the medical board in his district?

Answer—1. Yes, if he wishes to be examined. He can go to any board he wishes before November 10. 2. He is not bound to go to any unless he so desires. He must report for service or claim exemption at the postoffice before that date, and then await further instructions.

Question—I have been examined and placed in Category A-2, but I think I have good grounds for exemption, and have applied for same. Should my application be refused, could I enlist in any battery or corps

Answer—If you learn of the result of your claiming exemption before December 10, or in fact, before you are notified to report for service, you have the choice of joining any combatant unit except the Army Service Corps. Of course the unit chosen must be allowed to take on men, and must not be full up Units which are not full up now, may be by that date, so you should act as quickly as possible. The units at present open to such men are the 63rd and 64th Batteries, the 1st Depot Battalion, W. O. R.; the Royal Flying Corps, and the Canadian Navai Service.


