

## Our Consumers' League

#### Consider the Grocery Man

"I do wish you would write something in your Consumers' column about the thoughtlessness of so many London housekeepers where their grocers are concerned," said a well-known London woman the other day. "I don't say that the stores should all be closed at 6 o'clock on Saturday night, but I do say," she continued, "that some women need to have their eyes opened to their selfishness and what it means to others. They could as easily as not order their Saturday groceries early in the day in order to give the delivery people a chance to get home in decent time. It isn't fair for women to take advantage of the fact that they are customers to telephone in a small order at 8 or 9 o'clock at night and expect it to be delivered.

ORDER FRIDAY.

Why not make a list of the things wanted and order from that list as early in the day as possible? To be sure, there are times of sickness in the home and exceptional conditions which make it impossible to be considerate as one might desire. But any grocer will understand this case of emergency and be willing to meet the need. It is the practice of being inconsiderate which wears out patience and is truly unforgivable.

Supposing some one, two or three things have been overlooked on the list, and the need arises for them late in the afternoon or early in the evening, why not carry home something yourself, just for the sake of doing unto the grocery man, the butcher man, the extra clerk or the delivery man, as you would like to have him do unto you if the positions were reversed?

Why not start out the new year by doing some thinking from the standpoint of some other people's shoes for a while, instead of narrowing your vision to what you want, when you want it,
