The big track and field meeting was held at the University of Toronto, where the Amateur Athletic Association in London gave Saturday that the revival is permanent, and will draw a large attendance and the quality of the events will make support certain for the next years.

Walter Dutton, although beaten in the 100-yard dash, open, by Ponton, Olympic sprinter from Broadview Y. Toronto, piled up the biggest individual point total.

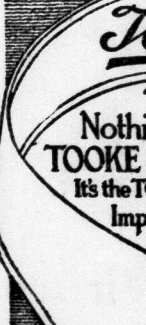
