Some time will be required before the system is working properly, Mr. McNab said. A number of new men have only been on for a day or two, and it would be unfair to lay them off today. In a week or so it is expected arrangements will be perfected so that the work will be divided evenly among the newcomers.

Sewer construction is the work on which most of the city employees are now engaged, although a few are still working at paving.

About forty men have been engaged by the new bureau since it was opened by William Casson. Five were taken on the first day and thirty-four Wednesday.
