PROPOSE SCHEDULE FOR CIVIC SALARIES

Auditors Submit a Report With Recommendations-Didn't Inspect the Offices.

A formal schedule of salaries for rivic employes from the junior, with minimum of \$200, up to the lordly maximum of \$10,000 for a departmental head, was submitted to the board of control by special auditors Vigeon and Barber, who were appointed some Barber, who were appointed some months ago to draft such a schedule. months ago to draft such a schedule.

Just how far-reaching its efforts may be, civic officials say they are unable to estimate for the present, and whether the adoption of the proposed scale would mean swelling the total of the civic salaries budget.

City Treasurer Coady says that it is the usual practice to start juniors in the City Hall at about \$4 a week, which corresponds with the scale. As for the clerks from the grade immediately above that of junior to the position of chief clerk, there is quite a wide dif-ference in the salaries paid in the different departments. It has frequently been a cause for complaint that men work as others are paid from \$50 to \$150 a year less, and it is senerally admitted that a set schedule is needed to insure equitable reward. doing practically the same class of needed to insure equitable.


