Pte. "Pat" Murray, who has three sisters living on Beaton street, has been reported killed. He was about 25 years old, and enlisted with a railway battalion...

Lieut. Charles Ready, of the Royal Berkshire Regiment, has died of wounds in action on April 29. He was previously reported missing. Lieut. Ready was in his 28th year...

Sergt. F. Flah, of 223 Park avenue, died of wounds on July 30. It was stated that he had been dangerously wounded. Since he enlisted in a St. John battalion, a few months after the war began, his father died in New Brunswick...

Pte. Wm. Duggart, 182 Commodore avenue, was dangerously wounded on July 26. The latest news is that he has succumbed to the injuries. He left Toronto for overseas in October last, and before enlisting worked as a decorator. He was born in Belfast, Ireland, and came to Canada four years ago...

Pte. Richard E. Taylor, of 212 Geary avenue, was wounded by gunshot in the face and knee, and admitted to Norfolk War Hospital, Norwich, July 26. He went overseas in May, 1916, and entered the trenches with his parents in a reduction of the city limits...

Pte. John Wesley Hurst, 313 Booth avenue, who was wounded in May last, is again reported injured. He went overseas in May, 1916, and was drafted to work in a factory in London over by the Government for the repair of Ross rifles. Later he was sent to the front. Al born in England, he has been in Canada since 1910...

Pte. Hugh J. McNicol, who went away last September with a battalion, been wounded by gunshot in the left arm. He lived with his aunt, Mrs. Charles McNicol, at 1148 Queen street west. He was born in Toronto, and was working before enlisting worked as a baker. His father, Thomas McNicol, is at present in the United States.

Pte. James Tarr, 107 Arthur street, is reported as having been wounded with a Toronto battalion in 1916. He is 32 years of age, and a native of England. He is married, and resides at 244 1/2 Bellwoods avenue.

Pte. John Lionel Coleough, age 19, the youngest son of Mrs. A. Coleough, 107 Eglinton street, was admitted to the General Hospital, Rouen, July 23, suffering from gunshot wounds in the lower extremities. He went overseas in October, and was drafted into a construction battalion. Pte. Coleough was born in Toronto, and was educated at St. Patrick's School. He was a member of the Broadview Y.M.C.A. and the Classic Athletic Club.

Private Charles Henry Coombes was wounded in the head, arm and thigh by gunshot on July 26, and admitted to the New Zealand Hospital at Anfield, London. He was shot in the head and returned to the trenches in December. He went overseas in August, 1916. His wife lives at 45 Sullivan street.

Pte. F. W. L. Morgan, 62 Waverley road, is missing. He is the information to hand. His commanding officer had already notified his parents and his relatives in the official list. His name appears in the official list, and had been several months in France. He is 23 years of age and an Irishman by birth, and prior to enlisting was employed in the Northern Crown Bank, Seely's Bay.

Lieut. E. H. G. Worden has been seriously wounded. He enlisted in the University of Toronto Overseas Service, and later became a Royal second lieutenant. He went to France in March, 1917. His mother lives at Guelph.

Lieut. Cecil C. Ha'scourt has again been wounded and admitted to the New Zealand Stationary Hospital, Hazebrouck. After taking his degree at Toronto University, Lieut. Ha'scourt went overseas with 2nd Division of the Canadian Expeditionary Force in May, 1915. He took part in a commission in the 10th Royal Warwickshires, and while with them at the Somme in November, 1916, was slightly wounded in the face.

Lance-Corp. J. McCann, who was reported seriously wounded in March last, is again in the wounded list. He went overseas in March, 1916, and has been in the trenches over a year. He is 31 years of age, and came to Canada in 1904 from Scotland. While in Toronto he was employed as a bricklayer. His wife resides at 255 Bloor avenue.

Pte. D. Norman, whose name appears in the casualty list, is one of the 24 men who were killed in action on October 24, Toronto, who are doing their bit in the cause of the empire. Pte. D. Norman is reported to have been killed in action in the trenches on October 24, 1915. He was badly wounded in the head and was in hospital for 12 months. He is 26 years of age, a native of London, England, and had been in Canada about eight years.


