

CIVIC ELECTION RESULTS SHOW TORONTO REMAINS TRUE TO THE HYDRO

WARD ONE PROVIDES EXCITING CONTEST

Rev. F. E. Powell Returned for Board of Education With Large Vote.

With eleven candidates in the field for the aldermanic race, there was no lack of representatives to pick from in ward one, and with one seat rendered vacant by Alderman W. W. Hiltz, who decided to go for the board of control, and the remaining two aldermen, Richard Honeyford and Frank M. Johnston, again seeking the suffrage of the ratepayers, the election was decidedly interesting and a large vote was polled, resulting in the re-election of the two former aldermen. Mr. Honeyford leading all candidates by a majority of 412 over Alderman F. M. Johnston, who secured second place.

Ex-Alderman A. H. Wagstaff secured the third place and will fill the seat left vacant by Alderman W. W. Hiltz.

Lieut. Robert Luxton, M.C., was a close fourth and W. A. Summer-ville secured fifth place.

In the present election Alderman Honeyford and Johnston, change positions. Alderman Johnston heading the poll last year with 139 votes ahead of Alderman Honeyford.

The representation on the board of education is unchanged, last year's trustees being re-elected with an increased number of votes to their credit. Rev. F. E. Powell received 1,553 more votes than last year, and P. M. Douglas 697. Mrs. Archdekin was the third highest in the board of education race of five entrants, receiving 1,822 votes.

BEAMISH DROPS INTO THIRD PLACE

Dr. Noble of "Frills and Fads" Is Defeated in Ward Two.

The aldermanic vote in Ward two compared peculiarly with that of last year. Alderman Winnett climbed from third place to the head of the poll, whilst Alderman Beamish declined in popularity from the extent of carrying only third place. J. N. Day, who ran seventh in the 1920 contest, landed this year to within one place of the charmed circle.

Risk maintained himself in second place and polled 400 votes over his last year's record.

Ward Two was conspicuous as the Waterloo of Dr. John Noble, the apostle of "Frills and Fads." The veteran trustee was within 114 votes of supplanting Mr. Beamish, who, in turn, was led by a majority of over 400 by Major Wemp.

Ward Two, in its vote for controllers, accorded Mr. M. P. Hiltz the substantial figure of 3,855. Alderman Hiltz was its second choice, with H. H. Ball a close third. Fourth place was insecurely held by Controller Ramsden, who polled slightly over 100 more votes than Alderman Nesbitt.

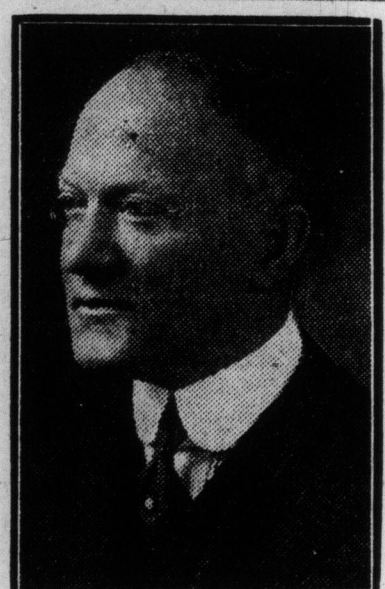

shown a disposition to vote with the mayor in the past and will likely continue to do so.

Controlled Ramsden, who with Controller Cameron, fell by the wayside in Saturday's battle, was an alderman for seven years and controller only once.

His first year was 1902, when he was sent to council from Ward 3. During his aldermanic career he remained in Ward 3. Controller Cameron was an alderman only two years, namely, 1914 and '15, and the controller in 1916, '17, '18 and '20. He ran against Mayor Church for the majority in 1918 and was defeated by 8,510 votes.

Of the candidates defeated, Messrs. Robbins and Ball were candidates last year. Both polled more votes than they did last year and were only a few hundred behind the lowest winner, so have no reason to feel discouraged.

All the questions and bylaws received an affirmative vote, with the exception of the secession referendum in North Toronto. The vote shows 646 for separation from the city and 1,864 against separation. The vote for the Hydro bylaw was overwhelming. Only 1,584 voted against it, while 28,809 were for it.

The one surprise was the announcement of the electors of daylight saving. The storm raised last summer against "summer time" was apparently not as terrible as it seemed at the time. Strong approval of both the dwelling house exemption bylaw and proposal to lay water mains on the local improvement policy was expressed by the ratepayers.

New Faces in Council.

There will be six new faces in this year's council, namely: Wagstaff from ward 1, Rose from ward 3, Mrs. Small from ward 5, Hacker from ward 6, Davy from ward 7 and Cruise from ward 8. The missing ones are: Controllers Ramsden and Cameron, Ald. F. W. Johnston of ward 3, Ald. Pleuman of ward 5, Ald. Maher of ward 6 and Ald. Miskelly of ward 8. The last two voluntarily retired. The election of Mrs. Small in ward 4 adds another woman to the aldermanic circle, which now includes two ladies. Mrs. Hamilton was elected in ward 3 last year and was the first woman to sit in council. She was elected again this year.

In his earlier mayoralty rights Mayor Church received only one acclamation, which was in 1917. His first fight in 1915 was against J. O. McCarthy, whom he defeated by a majority of 4,461, the vote being 26,047 to 19,586. The next year his opponent was Harry Winberg, who was left behind by a vote of 25,659 to 9,890. In the contest of '18, in which R. H. Cameron was the other contestant, Mr. Church got 27,695 votes and Mr. Cameron 12,995. The 1919 battle was among four contestants and the results were: Church 28,020; John O'Hall 16,230; W. H. Shaw, 5,773; Thomas Foster 2,190. Last

year's was a three-cornered fight and the votes went: Church, 25,730; McBride, 20,818; Ballantyne, 5,589. This time the mayor got 35,958 and McBride 19,966.

The votes cast in the last seven elections were: 1915, 45,632; 1916, 38,447; 1917, 30,685; 1918, 45,600; 1919, 45,202; 1920, 62,127; 1921, 55,934.

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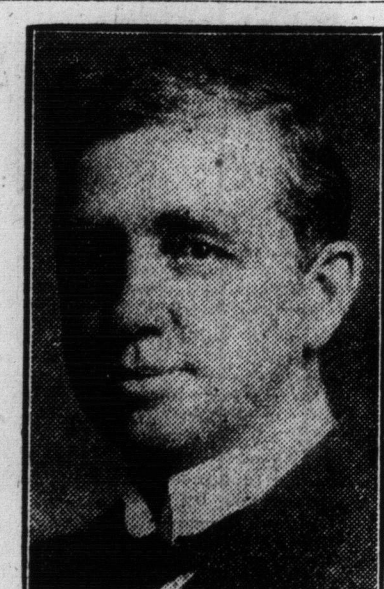
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
