Question No. 2,445—Mr. Cossitt:

1. What was the construction cost or estimated cost of all CBC French language (a) tv (b) radio stations, in provinces other than Quebec, presently operating, under construction, or in the planning stages and what is the combined total?

2. What is the annual actual cost or estimated cost of all CBC French language (a) tv (b) radio stations presently operating, under construction, or in the planning stages, in all provinces other than Quebec and what is the combined total?

3. (a) What is the combined annual cost of all items in Parts 1 and 2 (b) how many French language (i) tv (ii) radio stations are involved and, of these, how many were constructed, planned, etc. since April 20, 1968?

Hon. John Roberts (Secretary of State): I am informed by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation as follows: 1 and 2.

Order Paper Questions

3. (a) The question cannot be answered in a meaningful way as the "construction costs" show in part 1 above are a one-time non-recurring capital expenditure, whereas the annual costs are recurring. Therefore, the answer is as shown in part 2. (b) (i) 103; (ii) 120. Since April 20, 1962: TV—constructed, 27; under construction, 7; planned, 59; Radio—constructed, 36; under construction, 11; planned, 46.

FOREIGN AGRICULTURAL WORKERS

Question No. 2,466—Mr. Demers:

1. During 1976, in Quebec, did vegetable gardeners employ foreign workers who had temporary work permits and, if so, what (a) are the names and addresses of the gardeners (b) was the number of workers involved?

2. During 1977 to date, in Quebec, were vegetable gardeners authorized to bring in foreign workers who had temporary work permits and, if so (a) what are the names and addresses of the gardeners (b) on what date did they file their applications?

Hon. Bud Cullen (Minister of Manpower and Immigration):

1. Yes, in 1976 (a) 2 vegetable gardeners (See Note 1); (b) 32 workers.

2. Yes, in 1977 to date (a) 2 vegetable gardeners (See Note 1); (b) 24 January 1977, and 27 January 1977.

Mr. McCleave: Mr. Speaker, I rise again on a question of privilege which not only concerns unanswered questions of the hon. member for Leeds (Mr. Cossitt), but also some unanswered questions of my own. The other day, in response to the question of privilege I raised and to the motion upon which I founded it, the parliamentary secretary said that these things would all be done by the fall. I do not see any sacred difference between a fall date and this particular date. If there are answers to questions, they should be provided forthwith. If there are no answers, or the parliamentary secretary or his colleagues feel the questions are unanswerable, we should be told. This is a stalling practice and it is an invidious practice in the sense that we cannot read their hearts and minds or get through the small blood vessels to the Prime Minister's brain. The fact is, the questions are not answered because someone has animosity toward the hon. member for Leeds. I resent that, Mr. Speaker and I am going to voice my resentment at every opportunity.
