Boston, Oct. 22.—At the close of the
fiftieth day of the Episcopal General
Convention the House of Bishops and
House of Deputies were still at variance
on the question of marriage and
divorce.
The issue will be taken before the
body next week for the third time,
having declined to accept without
amendment the compromise measure
adopted by the deputies.
The House of Bishops to-day con-
firmed in the adoption of a resolution
by which special forms of worship
for foreign congregations affiliated
with the church are permitted.

Under a license issued yesterday she

farmer. It was her third trip to the

REVISION OF CONCORDAT

WOULD MEAN HUMILIATION

French Chamber of Deputies by De-

cisive Vote Sustain Separation

From Vatican.

Paris, Oct. 22.—By a decisive vote—
335 to 227—the chamber of deputies
to-night approved the government's
separation. In the midst of the rupture
of diplomatic relations between France
and the Vatican by the recall of Am-
bassador Nisard.The vote was taken after a boisterous
session in the course of which De-
puty Beaudry d'Amboise, chief of the
Minister Combes' "brigade," and was
restrained with difficulty from per-
sonally assaulting the speaker. He said
the rupture showed the impossibility
of continuing the present concordat
between the church and the state.The concordat, which was signed in
1801, had been the subject of a long
and bitter controversy. It was the
