IMPORTANT NEW POSITION WILL BE FILLED SOON

French-Speaking Post Office Inspector For Maritime Provinces

MAXIMUM SALARY IS \$3,000 A YEAR

Moncton to be Headquarters—Eligible List Is Limited

An important step and one expected to facilitate the operations of the service in many districts of the Maritime Provinces has been taken by the Canadian Post Office Department in a decision to add a new inspector to the section embracing the Charlottetown inspectorate. It is expected that an appointment will be made to the new office during next month.

It is learned that the new official will have his headquarters in Moncton. As he will devote most of his work to the French-speaking districts he will be required, necessarily, to speak both French and English. An appointment will be from the list of permanent employees of the postal service in the three provinces, and as only a small percentage of English-speaking employees of the department are thoroughly conversant with French, the choice, which will be made by the Civil Service Commission, will probably be confined to a comparatively small field of applicants.

LIVELY CONTEST PROBABLE.

News of the intention of the Postal Department to create the position has been received by most of the French-speaking employees who are eligible. In Moncton there are several men who are eligible; in Shediac there is one (Postmaster V. Bourque); in Saint John there are one or two; and there are several possibilities at various points in the French-speaking section of Kent county, Gloucester, Westmorland and Madawaska. But the number is limited in this province, and still more so in Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia, it is understood.

REASONS GIVEN.

The decision to appoint a bilingual inspector has been made for several reasons; first, to aid the French-speaking communities in the consideration of complaints and suggestions and those postmasters in the remote districts whose knowledge of English is limited; second, to enable the department to keep in closer touch with the status of these offices; third, to make the service more efficient in general, particularly in districts where the chief masters and assistants are handicapped by lack of familiarity with the English tongue, writing and printing.

MAXIMUM SALARY, \$3,000.

The Civil Service Commission will receive applications for the new position up to June 8, and it is expected an appointment will be made before the end of that month. The maximum salary, which will be paid to the new inspector will be \$3,000 per annum, or about \$60 weekly, with travelling expenses. At the start he will receive \$2,400 a year, which will be increased at the rate of \$180 per annum until the maximum is reached.

While at work in this province, the official will be under the direction of the superintendent at Saint John, and when in Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island he will be subject to the instructions and advice of the chief inspectors at Halifax and Charlottetown.

It is learned from official sources that the appointment must come from within the postal service in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia or Prince Edward Island, and that no application from persons not in the employ of the department in the Maritime Provinces can be considered.

In other words, the appointment will be tantamount to a promotion.

DEATH COMES SUDDENLY TO REV. G. LARDER

Anglican Clergyman Passes Away This Morning in Sussex

FAILS TO SURVIVE SHOCK FROM FIRE

Was From England and Had Been Appointed to Fredericton

Rev. George Larder, recently appointed clergyman at the Anglican Cathedral at Fredericton, died suddenly in Sussex this morning, where he had been for a few days, to see about the removal of his effects to the capital. A fire broke out, and the shock was too much for his constitution which was never very robust.

BORN IN ENGLAND

A native of England, and a graduate of Cambridge, Rev. Mr. Larder was ordained to the ministry of the Church of England by the Bishop of Ely in 1896.

For four years he was head master of Cavendish Grammar school in Suffolk, and in 1900 was appointed rector of Somerton, in the same county by his old college of Emmanuel. Eight years later he was given the living of Brompton Regis in Somerset. In 1914 he retired from parochial work, and with Mrs. Larder sailed for Canada to visit their son in British Columbia. The war broke out while they were at sea, and one their son enlisting they stayed to manage his farm. Mr. Larder acted as rector of Revelstoke, B. C. for a couple of years.

CAME TO NEW BRUNSWICK

After the war Mr. and Mrs. Larder followed their son to this province making their home at Sussex. Of quiet and scholarly disposition, Rev. Mr. Larder endeared himself to all who met him. He had acted as locum tenens in various parishes, St. Paul's, Saint John; Brompton Regis, Somerset, and elsewhere, and was in charge of the Cathedral at Fredericton during the recent illness of the dean.

He is survived by Mrs. Larder, and one son, George Larder of West Saint John.

The funeral will be held from Trinity Church, Sussex, on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock, Atlantic Standard time.
