Gets Divorce.

Colorado Springs, Col., Aug. 21.—Mary Ekins, 22 years old, obtained divorce here from Wilbur Corbett, prize fighter, known as "Bobby" Corbett. They were married in Kansas City, Mo., on March 5.

Mary, an Osage Indian, is the owner of 2,000 acres of oil land near Pawhuska, Okla. She contended that at the time of her marriage she was drugged and did not understand the nature of the contract.

She alleged that Corbett, immediately after the marriage, began to beat her, saying that a squaw had to be whipped to make her submissive. Moreover, she charged that her husband sought to draw her dividends and royalties, amounting to a large sum yearly and that he married her for her money only.

ON THE TRAIL OF INN HOLDUP MEN

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 20.—Bloodhounds tracking three of the bandits who held up the Allegheny Inn early Sunday and killed Patrolman Oscar Reinhardt, of Monroe, Mich., were taken off the case today when they led the posse of 100 men to the shore of Lake Erie, one mile west of Bolles Harbor, which had been the object of intense scrutiny.

Subsequent to this came a report from a farmer that he had seen two men in a rowboat pulling for Raisin Point, which forms a bay with the swamp penetrated by the bandits, who made away with money and jewelry valued at between \$5,000 and \$20,000 from the patrons of the inn.

The farmer's story was verified by the fact that marks showed that a boat had pushed off the shore. A small party of searchers set out across the bay for the point. The remains of a bonfire, which had been put out only about two hours before, spurred the remaining posse men on. The party worked their way down shore where they were joined by members of the 125th Howitzer Company, Michigan National Guards. The searchers also are covering Boulder Island, a two-acre tract off shore.
