

Lima Bean Salad

One cup canned or cooked dried lima beans, 8-4 cup diced celery, I teaspoon minced onion, 1 tablespoon minced green pepper, 2 tablespoons grated cheese, French dressing.

Mix beans, celery, onion and pepper with dressing. Arrange in neat mounds on salad plates, sprinkle with grated cheese, top with a dash of paprika and garnish with celery tops. A well-colored cheese adds to the attractiveness of the salad.


Two green peppers, I cup grapefruit pulp, 1-2 cup minced celery, slice of onion, 1 tablespoon nut meats.
