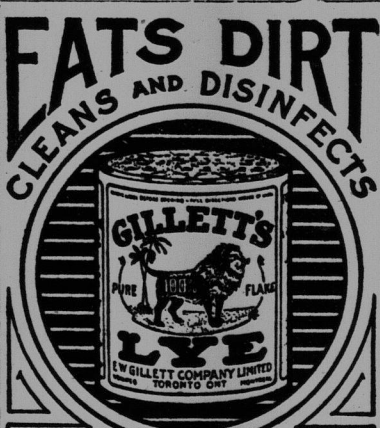

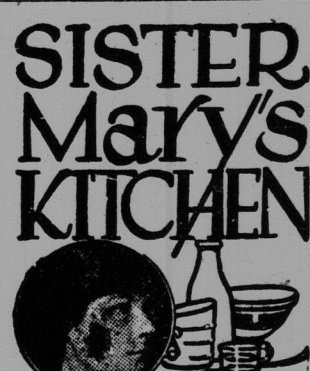

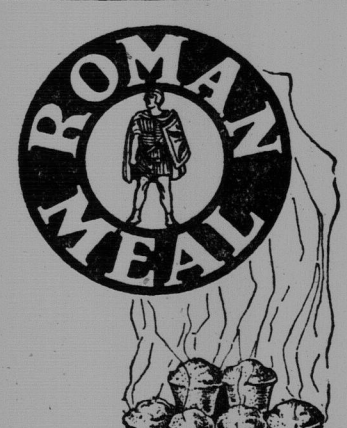

GRAPE JUICE.
Sometimes it seems almost impossible to provide the necessary mineral salts during the winter months when green things are scarce.
Heavier foods are demanded to produce heat in the body and supply energy, increasing the need of salts and acids.
One answer to this problem is found in the use of grape juice. The woman who canned or bottled quantities of this juice will find it a boon in offering variety to her cooking.
Aside from a drink for the convalescent or the party punch, grape juice can be used in many ways.
In a pudding grape juice gives just the richness of color and taste so desirable on a cold winter's night after a substantial dinner.
Grape Juice Pudding.
Two cups grape juice, ½ cup corn-

Two cups grape juice, ½ cup corn-

starch, 1 dessertspoon butter, ½ cup sugar, 2 eggs, ¼ grain salt, 2 teaspoons cold water.
If the grape juice is sweetened use less sugar. Dilute cornstarch with enough cold water to pour easily. Put juice and sugar over fire and when boiling stir in cornstarch. Add butter and cook, stirring constantly until thick and transparent. Remove from fire. Separate whites from yolks of eggs. Save yolks for sauce. Beat whites of eggs until stiff and dry with cold water and salt. Fold into grape juice mixture. Turn into individual molds to set and chill. Unmold and serve with custard sauce.

Tapoca Grape Juice.
One and one-half cups grape juice, 1½ cups water, 1-8 teaspoon salt, 2-8 cup sugar, ½ cup minute tapioca, 2 tablespoons lemon juice.
Put grape juice, water, salt and sugar in a sauce pan and put over the fire. When boiling, stir in tapioca. Cook, stirring to prevent sticking, until transparent. Add lemon juice and turn into mold to chill. Serve with or without whipped cream.

Ham Baked in Grape Juice.
One slice of ham cut three inches thick, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, ½ teaspoon cloves, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, grape juice.
Four boiling water over meat and let boil half an hour. Drain. Put in roaster or baking dish, sprinkle with spices and pour over grape juice to half cover meat. Bake in a slow oven for one and one-half hours.
