FIVE DOLLARS TOP PRICE FOR GOOD SCOTCH

Liquor Prices for New Brunswick are Out.

Are in Effect Today-Lowest Scotch Price \$4.50; Rye \$4; Brandy \$4.50 to \$6-Retailers Allowed 20 Per Cent.

Fredericton, N. B., July 15—Five dollars is now the top price for Scotch whiskey to holders of prescriptions purchasing from retail vendors under the prohibition act in New Brunswick.

Only three brands are quoted at \$5 in the price list forwarded to all retail vendor by the board of liquor vendors to be effective from today. There are four other brands of Scotch at \$4.90. a few at \$4.75 and the balance at \$4.50. Canadian rye whiskey will sell at \$4, brandies will range from \$4.50 to \$6, gins at from \$3 to \$4.50, rum at \$4, wines at \$3 and \$3.25, with champagne at \$5 a pint and ale and stout at from \$2.75 to \$3.50 a dozen pints. Alcohol is quoted at \$26.25 an imperial gallon.

Retail vendors are allowed a discount of twenty per cent, on the list prices as their profit under the regulations. Each vendor is required to have the list posted in a conspicuous place.

The new prices have been adjusted on a basis of new rates and duties, the duties having been increased practically one hundred per cent. recently. On this account the price of every bottle of liquor includes the sum of \$1.60 payable in duty as revenue to the federal government.

"The prices named in the list are the maximum under which the goods can be sold by the vendor, and the public is thus protected against inferior goods at exorbitant prices, the commission handling only standard case goods.



IN WALL STREET.

New York, July 15—(10:30)—Speculative shared again reflected sharp pressure at the opening of today's stock market. In the early dealings losses of one to two points were registered by Crucible and Bethleham steels, Harvester, General Electric, Sumatra Tobacco and Famous Players. Other steels, equipments, oils and motors were lower of fractions to one point and Western Union Telegraph extended yesterday's severe decline. Foreign exchange was reactionary, the London rate approximately the recent low quotation.

Dealings during the morning were on the smallest scale of any session in many weeks. Shorts effected further losses among steels, equipments and oils, also Farmous Players, Sears-Roebuck, International Paper, Union Bag, American Woollen, American Can and Shippings. Rails were neglected, the only changes in that division consisting of one point declines in Great Northern and Chicago Great Western. Losses were partly recovered before noon, when Mexican Petroleum rallied two points. Call money opened and renewed into next week at six per cent.
