A collision took place yesterday morning at Point du Chene on the I. C. R. in which Driver C. P. Atkinson narrowly escaped death. An engine crashed into another standing on the track.

It is said that a young woman of Albert County will be arrested either today or tomorrow on a charge of concealing the birth of a child. She is said to have given birth to an infant some weeks ago, and concealed its body in an attic. It was then dead, and the coroner's jury gave a verdict of death through criminal negligence.

Miles B. Dixon of Albert, clerk of the county court, was thrown from his carriage yesterday afternoon and severely injured. He received a painful head wound and was badly shaken up.

The application of the C. P. R. to remove the cattle sheds in Protection street, west end, was considered by the commissioners yesterday and favored. The change will be made at once.

Dalhousie, N. B., Nov. 5.—(Special)—The newspapers of Dalhousie who voted today on the principle of installing an electric lighting plant in the town to cost about \$20,000, strongly supported the scheme, the vote standing 122 yeas to 24 nays.



Plays and Players
CHATTY NEWS OF THE GREEN ROOM

George Redding, playwright and actor, convicted of the murder of Morris Greenberg of Hamden, in September, 1911, was hanged on Nov. 1 in Weatherfield, Conn. Redding's mother and father, his sister Mabel and his brother William visited him on Wednesday for the last time, and were accompanied by Mrs. Leora Haddock, a beautiful widow with whom Redding was infatuated, and to court whom he murdered and robbed Greenberg.

Mabel Harrison who died in Toronto last week is remembered particularly as appearing in the title role in "The Blue Moon". It is nearly two years, with tuberculosis, she had traveled all over the country seeking a cure. When first stricken, she went to Texas where she took a fresh air cure. At last she returned to her home in Toronto to die. Her husband, Joseph Howard, a noted actor and composer, was notified and started east immediately, cancelling all his engagements. He was at her bedside when she died.

When Miss Harrison and Clyde Fitch met at an auction sale of the art objects belonging to Lillian Russell, the dramatic actress, who had been in the city, became interested in her. When he completed the adaptation of "The Blue Moon" from the German, he asked Miss Harrison to take the title role. She accepted his offer and made a tremendous hit. "The Blue Moon" was his best work in "Dances in Toyland."

The season of grand opera by the Chicago-Philadelphia Opera Company began at the Metropolitan Opera House, Philadelphia on last Wednesday night with a performance of "Aida." A crowded house greeted the artists and it gave rise to the prophecy that this season will be the most notable yet given by the organization. The opening was made notable by the American debut of Miss Cecilia Gagliardi, dramatic soprano, in the role of "Aida," and of the tenor, Caliste.

Mme. Gagliardi made a splendid Aida, beautiful to look upon and with a voice that fulfilled the prediction made by her managers that she would win the same enviable laurels that she did in Spain and Italy. She is a very handsome woman with dark hair and eyes, a mobile, mouth, distinction and intelligence. She is a favorite in Madrid and Barcelona. Queen Victoria often goes to hear her. Some time ago, as a mark of her regard, she presented to Mme. Gagliardi a Spanish order. The late King Carlos had before this given her a Portuguese order. On all occasions when she was here. An exchange says: "It now turns out that Little Women, one of the biggest hits of the season, has experienced the same hard time of getting on the stage that the majority of successful plays have had."

The "thankfully declined" slip is not necessarily a patent of nobility, but the history of a great number of plays is that they were rejected again and again. "It is true of Elmer," "Within the Law," and "The Greenhouse."

"The Garden of Allah" has just finished an eight weeks engagement at the Auditorium Theatre, Chicago, to receive an exceeding \$200,000. This is without question a record for any attraction performed in the city.

Fred Lorraine, advance agent for W. S. Harkins, arrived in the city yesterday and is attending to a few days of business before the duties of his position for next week's engagement.

John Harkins, who played the leading role in "The Roarers" when it was produced in St. John, is now appearing in "The Fortune Hunter" through New England.

William Fawcett's production of Juliet Caesar, which has so favorably impressed the critics of Toronto, where it recently was put on for the first time, is scheduled to have its first New York production at the Lyric Theatre this week.

In the cast will be Julie Opp, Tyrone Power, Frank Kenna and Fuller Mollish. Emma Dunn, who played here with Harkins, won applause last week for her playing in "Mother" in the name of the Greenpoint Theatre, Brooklyn.

Charles Doughty's San Diego real estate man, who has quit Nat Goodwin's company, has been heard from. He is now in the city, where he will assume his old role of the leading character in George M. Cohan's comedy, "Get-Rich-Quick Wallingford," which is soon to be produced there.
