Apparently the acreage in alfalfa in the province has declined from 140 acres last year to 100 acres this year, and this would appear to show that the agitation in favor of more widespread interest in this most valuable crop is well timed. If the Ottawa estimate is correct, the acreage planted in potatoes this year is only 200 acres larger than that of last year, while the acreage in buckfwheat, and turnips, etc., is slightly smaller than a year ago.




