NOT SO MANY LOGS DOWN THIS YEAR

Bangor Raftsmen Handled About Ten Millions Less Than Usual

TOTAL IS 55,000,000

The Rafting Season Will be Ended in About Two Weeks—New System Being Employed Under New Manager at The Bangor Booms

Bangor, Nov. 1.—In two weeks from now the last log of the approximately 55,000,000 feet of lumber that will have gone through the Bangor boom will have passed through the sorting yard. The season will see about 5,000,000 less go through the boom than last year's season, which was the same number under the average, so that this year the number of feet that will make up the total for the season will be about 10,000,000 less than usual.

The boom is a busy place just now, with fifty men and boys at work sorting the logs, rafting them and taking them down to the mill, to be used for pulp, lumber and other purposes.

Most of the men take their meals at the boom, where a boarding house is kept by the company. The pay generally includes board, and it is good for the young boys who work there, late from 17 to 20 getting \$1.00 a day and board. The rule of the boom is early to bed and early to rise; work commences at 6 o'clock every morning.

At the boom now there are about 1,500,000 feet of logs, extending over five or six acres of river front. Half the river from the Eastern Maine General hospital down to Merrimack street, is completely filled with these products of the Maine forests. Estimating each log at 30 feet in length, there are 50,000 logs in the boom or rafted.

In the method of rafting there has been a radical change since Mr. Carlin assumed management. Formerly the logs were rafted in a straggled manner; now they are rafted lengthwise of the river, which makes the rafting a great deal easier and allows of doing more work.

Besides the fifty men at the boom, the Bangor Boom Company has forty-five men on the drive. The drive left the Trip, just above Milford, on Monday. There are about 600,000 feet in it, and they make up what remains of the rafting to be done.
