FREED FROM PRISON; HE CHALLENGES PROSECUTOR

Count Wolf Mettenich Objected To Lawyer's Remarks About Wife

Berlin, April 27.—In the recent gambling trial in which the spendthrift Count Gilbert Wolf-Mettenich was implicated, the imperial prosecutor, Doctor Porcili, speaking for the prosecution, made some unfavorable remarks concerning the young count's wife.

Now that the young count has served his sentence of imprisonment, he has challenged Doctor Porcili to fight a duel, on the ground that his remarks regarding the countess were insulting.

The imperial prosecutor declined to fight and brought the matter before a council of honor. This body, which includes several specialists in affairs of honor, decided for Doctor Porcili, on the ground that a man who had served time in prison was entitled to no reparation.

DISCOVERIES BY ARCHAEOLOGIST

Interesting Reports From German Expedition of One of "Ancient-Hittites" Captains

Berlin, April 27.—Doctor von Oppenheim, in charge of the German expedition to Central Mesopotamia, has sent home fascinating reports of his work at Tel-Hadad, one of the capitals of the ancient Hittites. It is believed by archaeologists that his reports will throw a flood of light on the somewhat mysterious civilization of this ancient people who flourished 1,400 B.C.

The chief work of Doctor von Oppenheim lately has been the excavations around the royal palace. This building he has succeeded in tracing fully, and more than 170 stone carvings, some of them of gigantic size and most vivid in execution, have been laid bare. One of the figures is a sort of Hittite Hercules, a man clad in lion's skin and armed with a club; another is an allegorical picture of great interest showing a bearded man being subdued by two youths and fettered. It is believed to be symbolic of spring conquering winter.

Two gigantic winged beasts in basalt have been discovered and are believed to have stood one at each side of the entrance to the palace. All the sculptures are reported to be in an excellent state of preservation.

FARMERS OF THE BORDER DISCUSS CO-OPERATION

(St. Croix Courier)

The meeting held in the agricultural hall on Saturday afternoon to consider the advisability of establishing a co-operative store in St. Stephen, was attended by more than fifty farmers. Frank Thomas was elected chairman and Frank Scott secretary.

In assuming the chair, Mr. Thomas said that the move appealed to him as a step in the right direction. Agricultural societies had accomplished something for the farmers but they did not go far enough and by a united effort in this movement in this direction they could take a step forward.

John Webster spoke of the success which had attended a similar movement at Harvey and when he was approached in the matter it appealed to him as a good idea. He read some correspondence from the secretary of the Harvey store, giving details of its organization and management.

Thos. B. Speedy, who has been a member of the Harvey society since its organization, gave an interesting history of organization that has been crowned with great success. They are paying for farm produce more than can be got at St. Stephen. The benefit is in buying and selling together. The farmers of the class that are not united for their own benefit and it is time they were doing something in this line, he advised.

John Gill, donkey engine man aboard the Californian, gave evidence regarding rockets sent. Before going below about 11:50 o'clock he said he saw a steamer pass them at full speed. They were drifting with the ice at the time with their engines stopped. Later on he went on deck again and saw a rocket from a steamer which would be about ten miles away. Seven or eight minutes later he saw another rocket. He went below without mentioning the matter to any of the officers. Gill's story was denied by Captain Lord.

NOW SHIFT IT TO THE CALIFORNIAN

Washington, April 26.—Captain Stanley Lord of the steamer Californian, who was before the senatorial inquiry yesterday gave evidence that at the time of the Titanic disaster he was within nineteen miles and could have reached her in two hours if they had been warned of the steamer's presence.

His wireless operator had warned the Titanic about eleven o'clock of the presence of ice but the operator refused to tell the captain. The operator said he did not hear the captain's order to stop or to slow down.

Later the second vessel sent up rockets, but they were not distress signals. The operator said he failed to get in communication with her and the steamer away soon after ten o'clock. She was not the Titanic.

Cyril Evans, wireless operator on the Californian, told of communicating with the Titanic but being told to shut up as they were sending private messages to Cape Race. The witness had been told by members of the crew that rockets had been sent up by the steamer during the night but that the Californian had not responded except by its attempt to get in touch with the Titanic.

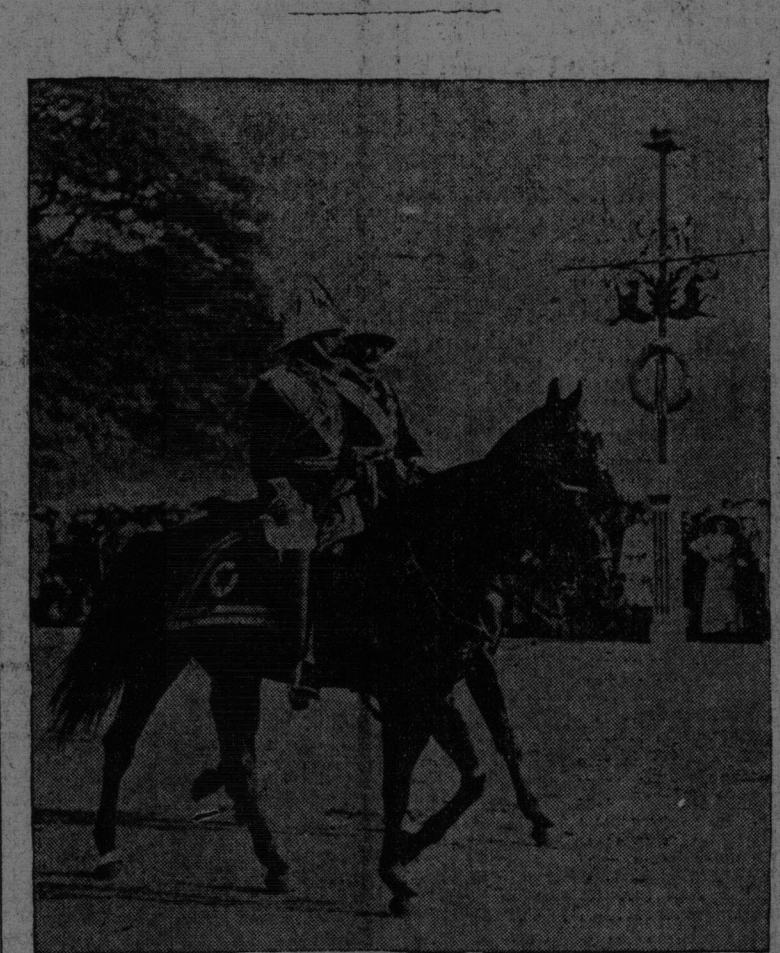
WAS WELL PRESENTED
