THE SENATE AND RECIPROcity

(Washington, June 29.—(Canadian Press))
While both branches of congress were in session today, interest continued to center in the senate, where the opponents of the agreement with Canada now have fairly begun their attack on the reciprocity bill. A speech by Senator Gamble of South Dakota, against the measure, and a continuation of the remarks of Senator Cummins of Iowa, who has denounced the bill as unjust and proposed amendments augmenting the number of Canadian products admitted free under the bill, were prepared.

Chairman Penrose of the finance committee, in charge of the bill, is adhering to his programme of persistently offering amendments for unanimous consent to a date for a vote on reciprocity, wool and free list bills, and may renew that request at any time.

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ONCE MORE IS SHOWN UP THE INSINCERE TORY

Montreal Paper Sets Forth Plain Facts About Reciprocity
They Forget That Principle Was Long Endorsed by Both Parties in Canada — Liberals Redeeming Pledge—Spurious Imperialism of the Conservatives

(Montreal Witness.)
Every day one can meet people who have not yet grasped the fact that the principle of reciprocity has long been endorsed by both the political parties of Canada. It is wonderful indeed, how short the political memories of people can be; and how safely, at times, political leaders can count upon this forgetfulness. Now that the parties have divided on the question of reciprocity, there are thousands of Conservatives who fancy that they have always been the stern and unbending opponents of it.

It is sheer forgetfulness, having its origin in lack of earnestness in the study of political history and principles. Ideas are lightly accepted or rejected, according to the commotion of the party in question. What else can explain the curious forgetfulness of Hugh John Macdonald, the former premier, as to his attitude? How could he be his father's son, Hugh John Macdonald, except as an opponent of reciprocity? Yet far more than his belief in protection, which is a matter of fact was no more than a policy of expediency for what protection politically did for him in 1873, was his sense of gratitude for what protection afforded by the Conservatives.

CONARD COMPANY AGREES

LIBERALS REDEEMING PLEDGE

But in accepting frankly and fully the offer of the United States for a large and liberal reciprocity pact—which it would have been utter folly to have rejected—the Liberal party is certainly redeeming one of its great pledges of 1868. The frequent professions, therefore, on the part of opponents, and even Mr. Borden, echo them, that the project is 'something new,' and that the country is taken unawares, have no foundation, in fact, whatever.

LETTER FOR SOME Tories

That it is a spurious imperialism, however sincere its exponents may think themselves to be in the United States, is shown by the fact that nine-tenths of those who urge that reciprocity with the United States is disloyal are eagerly opposed even to the slightest increase of the existing British preference. The fact is that our true Canadian Tories, who still largely influence the Conservative party, in spite of the newer elements it has gained in recent years, never have changed, and probably never will, their old habits of thought. Ultra and exclusive loyalty was their noblest stock-in-trade in the days of the Family Compact, and it still keeps its place in the old shop window.

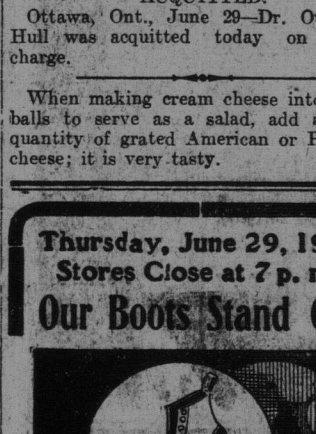
