DECISION UPHELD. In the Saint John County Court this morning before His Honor Judge Barry hearing took place a review proceedings in the matter of Earle O. McDonald vs. Wm. Collins. The case arose from a judgment given by Magistrate Lawson at Minto upon a claim by the plaintiff for a little more than \$60, the magistrate deciding in favor of the plaintiff. The defendant took the matter up in review this morning and Judge Barry upheld the decision given at Minto. A. B. Gilbert appeared for the defendant today and W. M. Ryan contra.

BOYS WORK BOARD CAMP. Thirty boys were in attendance yesterday at the opening of the New Brunswick Boys' Work Board camp for leadership training at Chipman being held under the auspices of the Maritime Religious Education Council. The boys will remain under canvas until July 27. The leaders are G. H. Gorbett, general secretary of the Maritime Y.M.C.A.; A. M. Gregg, general secretary of the St. John Y.M.C.A.; Rev. R. Taylor McKim, of St. John; Rev. W. C. Machum, general secretary of young people's work for the Baptist denomination in the Maritime Provinces, and A. B. Horwood, formerly boys' work secretary of the St. John Y.M.C.A. The boys in attendance are mostly group leaders and represent Tuxis squares.

JIM HUM BACK FROM CHINA. Jim Hum has returned after a seven months' visit to Hong-Kong, China. Jim is the young boy who has been, since early boyhood with his uncle, Hum Lin, now back in his homeland and H. S. Wah, Jim's cousin, with whom the lad works on the corner of Sydney and Leinster streets, in a laundry. Jim and his uncle went to China in the winter and Jim says that it was very hot in Hong-Kong, so he did not like it. He did no work while there, but just visited his mother, telling her all about his life here and about his Sunday school at the Central Baptist church and the good things he had learned in Canada. Jim's father is in a laundry in Boston, and he has one brother in China, where Jim has no desire to live. His hearing face testifies to the fact that Canada is really home to him now. The lad is about sixteen and has gone to school here and is altogether a Canadian in the making. Mrs. R. D. Christie is the superintendent of the Chinese department of the Sunday school, which has thirty members.
