The Delegates in England.

The London Daily Telegraph says of the Union Bill that "the details have been discussed by men whose names are not so well known in England as they should be—men who in practical statesmanship and general faculty need not stand comparison with legislators here at home." Of the Delegates' reception in England another English paper says:

In returning to their homes, crowned with the fruits of their long and self-denying labors we believe we may say with all sincerity that the authors of the union carry with them the hearty good-will of the statesmen, the best society, the best journalism, and the best popular intelligence of England. Some of them have been here for several months; but wherever they have gone, they have impressed themselves deeply and most favorably on those of their home-born and home-bred fellow-subjects with whom they have come in contact. And certainly they have had rare opportunities during their stay of studying the other country, which they so anxiously desire to continue in connection. From the Queen's Court to the commoner's club, from the peer's castle to the artist's workshop, from a Tory "at Home" to a "great Reform demonstration," from an Archbishop's palace to a curate's lodgings—nothing that London or England contains was beyond the reach of their observation. They came here nearly all colonials by birth—with eyes unprejudiced because unaccustomed to the peculiarities of English life and English society. They came desiring the continuance of the Colonial connection, and will leave us desiring it more ardently than ever. Knowing them to be able men, their disinterestedness showing them to be honest men, we are bold to say no higher compliment was ever paid to the general excellence of our English institutions than the convictions which this embassy of seventeen

carry back with them on that head to their Transatlantic homes."

WESTMORLAND BANK.—The Directors and Stockholders of the Westmorland Bank met at Moncton, on Monday last, for the investigating the affairs of that institution. It was ascertained, as we learned from one of the stockholders, that the assets of the Bank, exclusive of all doubtful claims, amounts to \$115,000, while its liabilities are only \$91,000, of which \$75,000 are in circulation, and \$16,000 are depositors. From this statement it would seem that the Bank is quite able to redeem all its paper, which ought therefore to circulate at a very small discount. A further investigation will take place on Monday next.

John Ross, for the long period of thirty-two years, and his faithful services in the cause of the Church," the Presbytery cordially attest as "a strong argument to extend to him now, in his declining years, a liberal allowance, as a recognition of the value of his past services and present labors, as the Presbytery are cognizant of the poor circumstances of the people in his district, and their inability to raise a sum sufficient for his support."

PARISH MEETING.—The meeting of Rate Payers for Town and Parish Officers will be held on Tuesday next in the Town Hall, and it is to be hoped that those who pay the largest amount of rates will take more interest than they have hitherto done. Some of the officers are more important than others, such for instance as Assessors of Rates. There can be no question, that this Parish has persons qualified to vote at the election for members of the Legislature, whose names have not yet been registered. Men should be appointed who would devote some time to their duties, and make a new and thorough valuation of the Parish. This would involve considerable labour, the Assessors however are paid for their services; the name of every person ought to be ascertained, and the ownership of property (in some cases a difficult matter) ascertained. It should be borne in mind that we will ere many weeks elapse, be placed under a new order of affairs, and it becomes the Rate-payers who study the interests of the Parish to make judicious selections and appointments. We throw out these few hints, in the hope that they will be a benefit to the people.—There are other offices, which should also claim attention of the people. We should have good and responsible men, men well fitted for the position to which they are elected.

The above was written but omitted in our edition last week.

An opinion prevailed that the Volunteers were not qualified to vote, and the chairman did not receive their ballots; it is to be hoped that this question will be settled at a higher tribunal, as a large number of loyal men are disfranchised. Several changes were made in Parish Officers.

Although St. Stephen is a part and parcel of Charlotte, and as a County journalist it comes within our province, to comment on the proposed measure, we abstain from doing so, as they have a local journal fully alive, and competent to deal with the subject.

The new life policies issued were 1,001, assuring £827,808, yielding in new premiums £25,161. A dividend of 10 per cent. was declared, and the sum of £15,161 was carried to reserve.—[Liverpool Mercury, March 7.]

STABBING AFFRAY.—Between 7 and 8 o'clock last evening a row took place on the Custom House wharf between some sailors belonging to the ship "Simonds," during which one of the parties named Alfred Addeline was stabbed very severely in the breast with a knife by Edward Rowe. The latter, who is himself very badly beaten about the head and face, was given in charge to the police. The wounded man was conveyed to the Marine Hospital.—[St. John Paper.]

BARBAROUS.—The following account of the execution of over one hundred French prisoners of war at San Jacinto, Mexico, by order of Gen. Escobedo, is taken from the Weekly Ranchero. It surely cannot be true:—"The order was executed on the 3rd inst., at 7 o'clock in the evening; or rather the execution of the 123 prisoners was finished at that hour. One by one the prisoners were shot, and each bloody body was left as it fell for the next victim in order to look. We are informed that but few of the doomed victims faltered; and when marched out for execution most of them sang the Marseillaise hymn.—After the execution at San Luis Potosi, in honor of the victory achieved over Miramor."

COCCULUS INDICUS IN BEER.—If it be true that we English consume about 900,000-1,000,000 gallons of beer every year—an increase of 40 per cent in 10 years ample opportunity must exist for adulteration in this particular article of general and every day consumption. It has been asserted over and over again that one of the ingredients is cocculus indicus.—Though we are not aware of any actual proof of its use, there is the most conclusive evidence that it largely is sent into this country, and that it is not used for medicinal purposes. What becomes of it? In 1865 9400 lbs. were imported, enough to adulterate 120,000 barrels of beer; and in an old treatise we find full directions given for its treatment in the manufacture of porter. The only inference that we can possibly draw is, that it is used by the brewers surreptitiously.

FEMALE CHARMS.—It is not to be supposed for a moment that ladies of the present day resort to artificial means of increasing that native loveliness which "when unadorned is adorned the most." Their great grandmothers, however, thought differently; and so numerous are the female falsifications become a century ago, that it was deemed necessary to introduce an act into the English Parliament in 1770, which provided as follows:—"All women, of whatever age, rank, profession, or degree, whether they be maids or widows, that shall from and after this act impose upon and betray into matrimony any of His Majesty's male subjects by pains, scents, cosmetic waxes, artificial teeth, false hair, Spanish wool, iron stays, hoops, high heeled shoes, or bolstered hips, shall incur the penalty of the law now in force against witchcraft and like misdemeanors; and the marriage, upon conviction, shall stand null and void."
