LAWSUIT FOLLOWS

Revelstoke—Bars Must Be Closed on Sundays

Revelstoke, May 27.-When the city ouncil met here it found itself face to face with two threatened lawsuits in onnection with the recently-constructed power dam, aggregating the sum of \$27,000. Seventeen thousand dollars of this Mr. Newman, the contractor, claims is due him for construction of the dam, but as the city council admits only of a \$2000 debt the communication threatening the suit was laid aside without discussion, which practically means that the city will stand by its guns and let the matter go to the courts. The second suit was for the recovery of a \$10,000 cheque deposited with the city by Mr. Newman for due performance of the work.
