"Advance" Scientific Miscellany. Experiments by M. Pasteur in vaccination for pleurisy have proved entirely successful. The new vaccine matter can be cultivated at pleasure, transported without injury, and preserves the animals into which it is introduced from a mortal disease.

These English Infallible Machines. (London World Aug. 3.) I have seen and handled many of the now notorious infernal machines, and a very ugly machine it is. Its aspect is not unlike that of a square coffee canister or a tin of preserved meat.

As upwards of five hundred tons of sugar made from starch are daily placed in the market, Prof. Wiley suggests the desirability of giving the substance a distinctive name. He proposes the name Amylose, from the Latin Amylon, starch. "Amylose" will include all sugars and syrups made from starch.

Experimental measurements of the temperature of the body have led M. E. Villari to the conclusion that the lowest temperature in man, occurring after a period of rest, is 98.4 degrees; that the temperature increases, under the influence of a positive, ascending effort, to 100.6 degrees, under the influence of a descending effort to 100.3 degrees; that it increases after an exertion, but more after an ascending than after a descending one; and that the chemical actions of the organism are augmented after every movement.

The researches of Prof. Flower, the well-known English anatomist, show some interesting results in relation to the comparative sizes of the heads of different races of people. The largest normal skull he ever measured had a capacity of as much as 2,071 cubic centimeters; the smallest, belonging to an individual of the nearly extinct people inhabiting central Ceylon, measured only 960 cubic centimeters.

A TENDENCY OF THE AGE.—To judge by the space given up to it, it would hardly be an exaggeration to say that the "Age" has devoted their exclusive attention to reading who would still be running, walking, polo, racquets, lawn tennis, chess, billiards or what, have just at present a better chance of immediate distinction and world-wide fame than is afforded them by literature, or art, or the checks, or law, or politics.—N. England and Her Colonies. The Earl of Darlington in an article in the "Nineteenth Century" says:—"Our colonies can supply us with every kind of raw material and we can return to them all manner of manufactured goods. With them we could be independent of all the world, and independent is a good thing for both men and nations. The future of England certainly depends upon her relationship with her colonies. She may remain the centre of a great empire, or become a small, scarcely populated, and insignificant kingdom. The dream of the Radicals appears to be to withdraw as much as possible from all colonial responsibilities, and to retire within the limits of these islands, occupying ourselves with our own limited affairs, and settling down quietly to enjoy a green old age, feeding our bodies with the proceeds of our savings, and our minds with the memory that England once led the van in the cause of civilization, peace, and civil and religious liberty. This dream is not an unpleasant one, but unfortunately it can never be fulfilled. England might gradually descend from the position of a first-rate power and a great growing empire into that of a small, fifth rate nation, tolerably prosperous, and civil and independent, but very, very large banking business, provided that she could get some one to guarantee her existence, and the integrity of those possessions which are necessary for her trade. But no European nation, save England. Nobody has any interest in doing so, except our own kin and kin beyond the seas. The British Islands might not greatly tempt annexation; but British possessions will remain British as long as we can hold them, by force if necessary."
