

If you, Mr. Editor, had had opportunities as I have, of contrasting the cleanly habits of English people on board ship with the frightfully dirty personal habits of others of different nationalities you would not have made the statement that "the soap and water Britisher is to a large extent a pleasing illusion." that "the soap and water Britisher is to a large extent a pleasing illusion."
