STILL ASHORE.

LONDON, Feb. 21.—The Canadian Pacific's Atlantic line str. Lake Michigan, Capt. Owen, from St. John, N. B., Feb. 5, for London, which collided with the British bark Matterhorn Friday last, is still ashore near Dungeness, in the Straits of Dover. A heavy wind is blowing, and if it continues it is feared that the vessel will become a wreck. Tags from Dover have succeeded in getting water aboard for the cattle, but they were unable, owing to the heavy seas, to supply the Lake Michigan with pumps. Forty-six of the crew were landed at Dover last night but returned to the vessel today. It is believed the steamer is damaged below the waterline.
