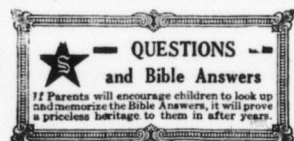

W. H. Parnall was an efficient chairman and made an appeal for early organization and hard work to the end.

The choir added much to the meeting by giving an anthem and the male quartette sang a number.

The speaker upheld the O.T.A. as the best act we have ever had, although by no means perfect, and said the cost of the vote could well be spent in enforcement.

He spoke with force and authority, and gave many facts and figures from his lifelong fight for better temperance laws and also from his experience in the Legislature.

All voters should consider who were asking for a change—it is not the churches, or preachers, or bankers, or merchants, or manufacturers, or labor.

In closing, Mr. Lethbridge made a strong appeal for all to work in making Midwestern a strong leader in rolling up a big majority for retaining the O.T.A.
