Seek Metro-Type Study

250,000 In South Peel By 1980

## FORESEE MAJOR CITY HERE!



Time Waits For No Man — That fact is evident as the Mississauga area receives a major face-lifting job. Above is seen the new Port Credit Legion, the Mississauga Rd., near the intersection of Indian Rd., and No. 10 highway, both of which are undergoing reconstruction.

With the long-awaited release of the Goldenberg Report, Toronto Township 'big city dream' of the future now looms as a more distinct possibility all the time.

Township Reeve Robert Speck has already asked that a study be made of this area with the view to forming some type of Metro-type plan here. At the present time, the township has its application for town status pending before the Ontario Municipal Board. This application was considered to be the first important step toward ultimately forming a city here with the towns of Port Credit and Streetsville joining up with the township, at some time in the future.

In past discussions between representatives from Toronto Township, Port Credit and Streetsville it was generally agreed that an amalgamation of these three municipalities would come about in the future -- possibly four or five years from now.

Any 'instant amalgamation', however, was frowned upon by most members of the Port Credit and Streetsville councils as they felt that such a move would be much too costly for their people right now.

It is not known right at this time what will happen to the township's application for town status since the suggestion for a complete study of Metro-type possibilities here could tangle up this move.

Whatever the future holds for this rapidly growing area, it is crystal clear that Toronto Township -- and Port Credit and Streetsville too, for that matter -- are growing in leaps and bounds.

Port Credit is growing up, changing the heart of its

area into a high-rise sector: Streetsville has plans for expansion in all directions and Toronto Township itself is a bee-hive of industrial and residential growth.

The Sheridan Park Research Centre -- known as Canada's 'space age city' -- is rapidly taking shape and the long-range forecast is that it will eventually be a \$100,000,000 scientific complex with new developments all around it.

And, to make the whole picture even that much more exciting, you and I are right in the middle of this overall plan.

### Township Puts Skids On Skateboards

Toronto Township Council passed a resolution Monday that a bylaw be prepared to prohibit the use of skateboards on public sidewalks and roadways in the township.

### Construction Of Atomic Energy Plant To Start Soon In Twsp.

Toronto Township's richest industrial area, the Sheridan Park Research Community -- situated on the North Sheridan Way between the Fifth Line and the western limits of the township and Peel County -- is taking shape in rapid style.

The man in charge of the planning and development of this tremendous research complex, Donald Fraser MacRae, has expressed his surprise at the manner in which this area has developed.

"It is going ahead much faster than we anticipated," he said recently.

Later this summer, Atomic Energy of Canada Limited will start construction of a development laboratory to house their Power Projects group of about 400 engineers and technicians. Their project will also include designing offices for their valuable work.

The International Nickel Company of Canada is expected to follow Atomic Energy of Canada into the

Sheridan Park scene. They in turn will be followed by Abitibi Power and Paper Co. Ltd.

Also scheduled for construction later this year is the Ontario Research Foundation's own building which will be built at the top of Sheridan Park's picturesque boulevard entrance. A multi-storey office building which will literally make this a town within a town (of the future) may also be built this year.

At the present time, all but 50 or 60 acres of Sheridan Park's 340 acre total have been taken by industries for research work.

When everything is finished, by 1975 at the latest, the total value of this highly scientific research centre will have reached approximately \$100,000,000.

This "space age city" will do a lot to bring this area world-wide recognition.

### Police Hunt Two Gunmen Following Payroll Robbery

Accosted by two men, one of whom was brandishing an automatic pistol, in the Dixie Plaza parking lot, Fred D. Smith, 65-year-old employee of the Electric Storage Battery Company, Dixie, was robbed of the company payroll which amounted to slightly over \$2,800 last Friday afternoon.

Smith tried to get away from the hold-up men as they forced him to go with them.

He was struck by the gunman and suffered three lacerations which required 12 stitches to close.

The robbers finally left Smith and the car in the vicinity of Dixie Road and the Lakeshore. Bleeding from the wounds in his head, Smith staggered to a nearby house and called the police. Shortly after he was taken to the South Peel Hospital where he was treated for his injuries.

Smith had taken a large number of employee paycheques to the Canadian Bank of Commerce. He cashed each of the cheques and put them in separate envelopes before leaving the bank to go back to his car.

The police investigation is under the direction of Sgt. of Dets., Mel Simmonds.
