

### *The C.U.L.N.S.*

**W**ITH this issue of Interdependence there appears for the first time the University Section, edited by the provisional executive of the recently formed Canadian University League of Nations Society. Its purpose is to provide a medium of expression for the League of Nations clubs and foreign affairs discussion groups that exist under whatever name in Canadian universities. The experiences of each club and group should be of value to the others. If these can be made known in this column, a valuable service would be done. The co-operation is solicited of all those in a position to make contributions.

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**T**HE League of Nations Club of the University of Toronto has the honour of being the first Club to become a member of the C.U.L.N.S. This Club was formed last year and successfully carried out an instructional inter-university Model Assembly. It now has a permanent constitution and meets regularly in weekly study-groups under the leadership of Prof. Norman A. Mackenzie.

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The universities of the Maritime Provinces are planning to hold a model assembly at Acadia University, Wolfville, N.S., sometime in February. The successful model assembly held by these universities in Halifax last year was chronicled in Interdependence at the time.

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A model assembly lasting only one night was held successfully by the University of Toronto branch of the C.U.L.N.S. in December. The main discussion was on a resolution favouring a United States of Europe.

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A League of Nations Club is being formed at Mount Allison University, Sackville, New Brunswick. Dr. F. W. W. DesBarres is taking an active interest.

The C.U.L.N.S. has been advised that Hon. Thomas Chapais has consented to act as correspondent for Laval University in matters referring to the C.U.L.N.S. Senator Chapais has recently returned from Geneva where at the League Assembly he was one of Canada's delegates.

The International Relations Club formed at the University of British Columbia last year has been invited to become a member of the C.U.L.N.S. It is understood that this invitation is being favourably considered and will be presented at the next meeting of the Club.

The Current History Group and the International Relations Group of the University of Saskatchewan have been invited to become members of the C.U.L.N.S.

Through the C.U.L.N.S., Interdependence is now exchanged with the following university undergraduate newspapers: Western University Gazette, McGill Daily and the Abysses of the University of British Columbia. It is hoped that the editors of the other University newspapers will accept an invitation to exchange publications.
