Drummond, St. Catherine street west. Park avenue and Mount Royal avenue with their projected boulevards uncommen on account of their elevation, their points of view, their grand, rich nature which only art and good taste can be embellish, and which in their brightest days will rival with those of Naples. Trees especially maple border the greater number of the streets in front of superb residences where a most pleasant and agreable promenade may be enjoyed. Admire the delicate construction of the Grand Trunk Depot; the massive construction of the Windsor and Viger depot which might easily be mistaken for fortresses or Old Country palaces.

Visit Windsor Hotel whose boarders and visiters may be annually numbered by thousands, and occupies an area of from 3 to 4 arpents with its 420 rooms 16 parlors, and hundreds of other apartments, and you will have an idea of the vastness of this gigantic edifice whose exterior is one of entire beauty.

The environs of Montreal are no lesseautiful, a fact of which one may be easily convinced by a car drive around the three mountains. Shoot the Lachine Rapids. Examine the new C. P. R. bridge whose length over the river is no less than 4000 feet.

Montreal can count three Universities; Bishops, Laval, and especially McGill which covers a surface of over 100 acres with its lawns, situated at the foot of Mount Royal, ornamented by a range of of superb buildings, all generous glits of our English millionnaires. Thousand of young men come here to draw from the fountain of liberal science under the able direction of select professors. McGill is unsurpassed by any university in America in the richness of its edifices in
