To the Electors of The Province of Ontario.
May I be permitted, obedient to the duty which I feel devolves upon me, to address a few lines to you regarding the great issues now so prominently before you. I have read carefully, as I feel sure all will, both Reformers and Conservatives, the open letter of that life-long Reformer, Rev. Donald C. Ross, who has felt compelled to indict his leader before the great tribunal of public opinion. The charges which he has made in such complete detail demand an answer, not by the agents of Hon. G. W. Ross, but by the Hon. G. W. Ross himself; and unless such an answer, direct and unequivocal, is laid before the public before polling day, I shall conclusively consider, as I feel sure the vast majority of the electors will likewise conclusively consider, that Hon. Surely when in Ontario the opposite party has been 32 years in power, or nearly twice as long, the argument is twice as strong against them as against the Conservatives in 1898.

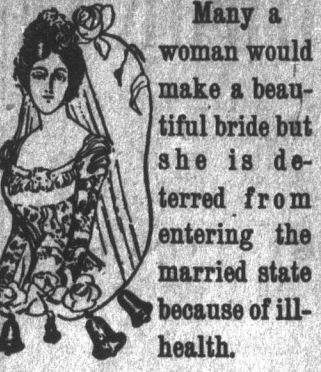
REGISTER! REGISTER!

It is necessary for every one to register who wishes to vote at the coming Provincial election unless his name is on Part 1 of the 1904 city list.
Registration at the recent Dominion election is no good for the Provincial election. The Provincial law makes re-registration necessary.
The days fixed for registration in Chatham are next Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the 11th, 12th, 13th and 14th days of January. The hours are from 10 to 1, 2 to 6, and 7:30 to 9 each day.
Persons residing over the river, which is No. 5 Ward, will register at the police station, and persons residing in any other part of the city will register at Harrison Hall before either Judge Ball in his chambers, James Holmes in Major Coogan's office, or Judge Dowlin in the Council Chamber. These are the same places that were used at the last registration.
It is well to register the first day or at the earliest time possible, for if a person who has had a chance to register is afterwards called away from the city and should not get back before 9 p.m. of the 11th, he would lose his right to register.
The qualifications are simple: reside in the Province for a year and in the city for three months next preceding the 11th of January 1905, being a British subject and 21 years of age. No property qualification is required. The only difference property makes is that tenants and owners, if assessed and living in the city at the time of assessment, are supposed to be put on the list without registration.
Make sure that your name is on the list of the names of your friends on. If you know of any person entitled to register, whom you can not see personally, telephone the name to S. B. Arnold or ring up the people's committee room, telephone No. 3. Remember the people's party can be aided greatly by the registration of every voter who is in favor of clean and honest Government.
If you are registered for the Dominion election in November last, you will have to register again. Don't forget that.
If you find you are not on No. 1 on the city voters' list go and register. The names of many owners do not appear on the lists and they must register.
The success of Mr. James Clancy depends upon a full registration of the voters of Chatham.

EXPLORERS' SUFFERINGS IN THE ANTARCTIC WINTER.

Some details of a remarkable story of privation have recently been made public by the commander of the recent Swedish expedition to the south polar regions. The three men who shared the hardships of that dreadful antarctic winter were Dr. J. Gunnar Anderson and two of the ship's men who left the steamer in an endeavor to reach by sledge Dr. Nordenskiöld's camp one hundred and fifty miles to the southwest. Sledging proved to be exceedingly difficult and by the time the little party reached land their strength and resources were nearly exhausted.
The twilight was lengthening, the long night would soon fall, and they knew that if they tried to make the march of one hundred miles southward they would certainly perish. There was nothing to do but go into camp and live out the winter somehow or other. They had about three weeks' supply of food, three sleeping-bags, a piece of tarpaulin and a tent, a few knives and cooking utensils, no needle, and nothing to wear but summer clothing.
They put up their tent and encircled it with a stone wall. Over the whole they spread their tarpaulin. When the snow came it covered all save the entrance. They were thus able throughout the winter to keep an average temperature of only a little below the freezing point.
Within a few miles there were plenty of penguins waiting to be shot, and by the time the winter night had fairly fallen they had killed

ed and frozen about four hundred of these birds.

Penguins are not good eating, but they were the staff of life to those three men that winter, and out of a mouthful or two of bread each day, a bite now and then of preserved meat, and the flesh of seals occasionally killed for oil. Everyone has heard of the revulsion of stomach and nerves from which men suffer when they try to eat a quail a day for thirty days. It can be imagined, then, that nothing but the fear of death would drive them to eat the coarse and grating penguin every day for seven months. The accomplishment of the feat showed what men can do when necessity drives.
But the hardest part of their lot, after all, was the protracted confinement during the long, stormy winter. Seal blubber was too scarce to be used excepting when the meals were to be cooked and so, for days at a time the three men curled up in their sleeping bags in pitchy darkness with nothing to do but listen to the howling of the storm. For seven long months they led such a life.
When the spring came they found their way to the camp. They were so changed that Dr. Nordenskiöld did not recognize them until they told their names. They were black as coal from head to foot, with long black hair hanging down over their shoulders. Their dogs took fright at the forbidding black creatures and bolted in every direction.
