IT WAS NOT PERJURY.

Mr. M. F. Smith Only Sware to Mistake.

Toronto, June 11.-In giving evidence at the trial of an action in the High Court of Justice on the 20th day of May, a witness, M. F. Smith, stated that he had, in making a statutory declaration, committed perjury. The witness, Smith, in admitting under oath that he had been guilty of perjury, explains that he did so under the belief that any incorrect statement made under oath, whether innocently or inadvertently made or not, was perjury. The facts in regard to the incorrect declaration, admitted by Smith to have constituted perjury, are as follows:—The witness, Smith, made a statutory declaration as to the amount of the pack of the Oshawa Canning of the pack of the Oshawa Canning Company for the year 1900, relying for the amounts upon an employee; that subsequently tree witness Smith checked over the figures of his employee and found the amounts stated in the declaration to be in excess of the actual amount of the pack. The parties inferested in the litigation have inquired into the circumstances connected with the making of said declaration, and have all admitted that the witness, Smith, before any money or other advantage could accrue to him or to the Oshawa Canning Company, made the matter right, and that no money or other benefit was obtained by the said witness, Smith, or the Oshawa Canning Company as a result of such error in said declaration.
