GOLD LANDS IN FRANCE.

Announcement Made of Some Rich Finds at Bas Coudray.

Paris, Dec. 28.-A sensational announce ous deposits found in antimony mines at Bas Coudray and Haut Coudray, in the department of Mayenne, France, by a French engineer, M. Herrenschmidt, who had been fifteen years in Australia. He says that deposits extending over several miles in quartz strata only twenty metres under the surface give from sixty grammes a ton to 120 grammes a ton, richer than anything he has seen in Australia. A company is already being formed in Paris to exploit the new Klondike.

STABBED TO DEATH.

A Midnight Tragedy at Vancouver-Japanese Ex-convict Murdered.

Vancouver, B.C., Dec. 27.—The body of Kawazan, Japanese, was found at noon to-day under a C.P.R. freight aoon to-day under a C.P.R. freight car in the yard, Kawazan having been stabbed to death. As far as the police can learn at present, Kawazan was at a Japanese gambling joint dast night, and their theory is that he was stabbed there during a dispute over money, as 50 cents was found in the murdered man's clenched hand, and that the body was then conveyed to the spot where found. Deceased was a convict in license from B. C. Penitentiary, having been sentenced to three years' imprisonment at Nanaimo for using a knife on a Chinaman while drunk.

BRITISH ARMY RECRUITS.

Physical Deterioration Reported by Authorities.
