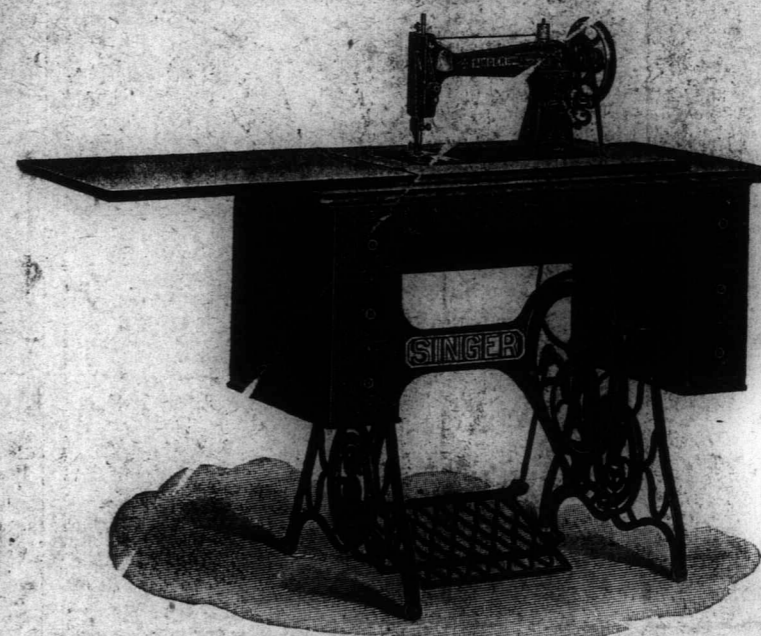

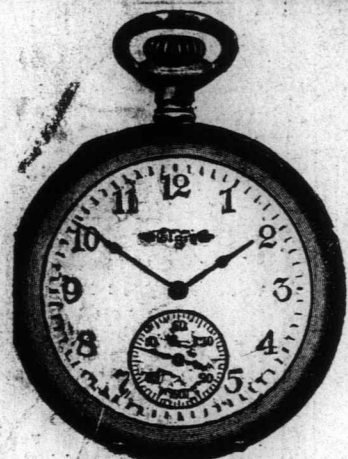

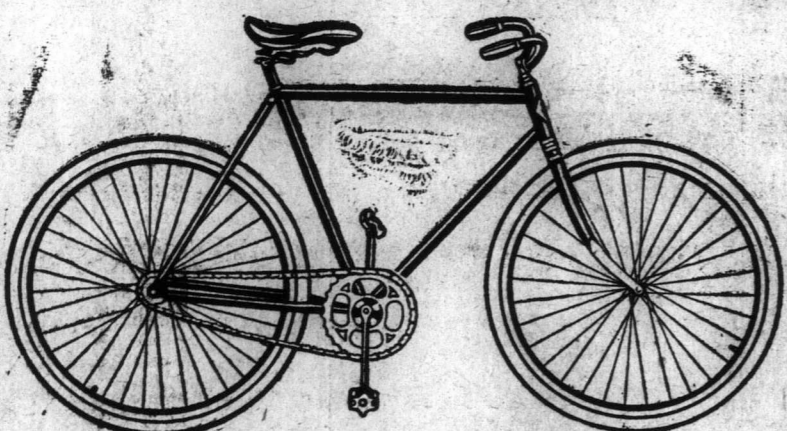

COMMONS CONTENT

Premier Borden, in Masterly Necessary if Name of F Word, and Confounds ments.

OTTAWA, April 10.—Premier Borden was greeted with Ministerial cheers when he arose in the House yesterday afternoon to introduce a resolution which he would not touch a very important subject because it was apparent to all members of the House that unless the House were permitted reasonable discussion of public business and the scrupulous conduct of debate, Parliament must fail in its function and the proceedings of the House be liable to be brought to a standstill and contempt. He acknowledged that liberty of speech, freedom of debate should be maintained under such conditions they would not degenerate into a sense and into obstruction.

During the sixteen or seventeen years in which he had been a member of the House there had been a great deal of discussion with regard to amendments of the rules. From time to time changes had been made, but the rules were still in a form which would permit a small number of members to prevent the transaction of any business at all. An ordinary resolution, passed through no less than nineteen stages including the committee stage, any one of eighteen of these stages every member might move an amendment so that with the Speaker in chair, there might be fifty or sixty more motions upon which every member might speak at such length as might seem to him desirable.

"It seems to me that conditions that kind cannot result in the transaction of business; if a certain number of gentlemen, and that a very small number, should be disposed to engage in obstruction. You have addition to that the committee stage at which it is possible for every member to speak as often as he please him. It will thus be apparent that the transaction of public business may be made impossible unless you have a convention—closure—agreement between the parties—the majority in the House shall be permitted to express their opinion by vote."

Changes in Liquor Act Will Mean Elimination of The

All liquor sold in taverns to be consumed on the premises, bottle trade eliminated.

Shop and tavern license to be placed on uniform footing, advancing smaller fee of shop to present to same as that of tavern.

Livery stables and similar lounging places to be subject to same penalties for having liquor on premises as boarding houses at present.

Hour of opening in morning changed from 6 to 8 o'clock.

The above are the proposed changes to the Ontario Liquor Act announced yesterday by Hon. W. Hanna, the Provincial Secretary. Changes are considered somewhat radical by local hotelkeepers who consider their enforcement will put an end to many of the evils the business and put the latter on a better basis. The stopping of the nuisance is regarded as an effective move, while keeping the hours closed until 8 in the morning is considered desirable by the hoteliers from all viewpoints.
