REFUSES TO PAY TAXES

Sir E. Carson at Mass Meeting of Ulster Business Men.

Ulster, the entire audience stood up and cheered this statement for five minutes. Sir Edward Carson said the demonstration gave the lie to those who declared that Carism was waning. In America and the Colonies their opponents had been saying:

"It is all very well for these working classes and artisans to be going on with their drilling and their voluntarism, and all the rest of the buffoonery; but when the business men find that their interests are likely to be effected they will soon step in and put an end to it all."

At a meeting of 5,000 business men at Ulster Hall, Belfast, on Tuesday, Sir E. Carson asked for a Government order towards a settlement in black and white. It was officially stated that the capital represented at the meeting amounted to £144,000,000.

Two resolutions were brought forward. The first moved by Mr. J.H. Sterling, a flax manufacturer, was that all business men should hold back payment of such taxes as they could control so long as any attempt was made to put Home Rule into operation. They would not supply the funds to be used in coercing them into submission.

The resolution was supported by Mr. C. E. Allan, of Workman and Clark, the shipbuilders, and adopted. The second resolution, moved by Mr. J. Milne Barbour, a linen thread manufacturer, expressed "cordial sympathy with the measures taken for the defense of our interests, including the formation of the volunteer force," and was adopted.

When Mr. Sterling declared, whatever the settlement of this question might be, one thing it must never be, and that was establishing a Parliament in College Green over Europe is becoming stirred up over atrocities in Russia.

Greece Still Holds Prisoners.
SOFIA, Nov. 24.—Minister of Foreign Affairs Guenadiev has proposed to the French charge d'affaires here that the difference between Bulgaria and Greece concerning prisoners of war be submitted to arbitration by President Poincare. M. Guenadiev said Bulgaria would accept M. Poincare's decision unreservedly.
