

BRANTFORD WANTS GLEBE LANDS SOLD

ould be Made Accessible for Residential and Factory Sites.

OTTAWA, Dec. 2.—W. F. Cockshutt, M.P., headed a deputation which arrived here yesterday from Brantford asking that the Glebe lands of the city be marketed and made accessible for residential and factory sites. The deputation included Mr. Brewster, K.C., M.P.P., and Mr. Alan Spence, chairman of the Brantford Finance Committee, and they brought with them letters from the Board of Trade in support of their mission. The request was placed before Hon. Dr. Roche, Minister of the Interior, and the questions considered from the standpoint of the city and of the Indians whose interests are affected. The lands were surrendered by the Six Nations Indians in 1828 and again in 1845 to the New England Company which has carried on a Christianizing and missionary work among the Indians for nearly a century. The result of the deputation's visit will probably be an arrangement satisfactory to all the interests concerned. Mr. Cockshutt also arranged with the Public Works Department for improvements to the public building at Brantford.

DEAN CONNELL'S GRAVE CHARGES

Varsity and McGill Have Professionalized Rugby, So Professor Alleges.

KINGSTON, Dec. 2.—In addressing Queen's Ascension Society, Dean J. C. Connell said that Queen's should be ready to keep pace with Rugby changes. Toronto and McGill had today professionalized the game, the dean declared, and started the season with early training of their teams and the best of coaching, so that when Queen's almost inexperienced players met these hardened men they naturally lost and were discouraged. The material at Queen's is good, so if the other colleges were willing to professionalize the game, why should Queen's hesitate, and thus lose as it had been doing? By all means let Queen's give way to the current of professionalism. Dr. Edward Ryan stated that professionalism had been tried at Queen's and was only the means of attracting men with more brains than brains, contrary to the object of a college. Consequently he did not believe in introducing professionalism, but he thought there should be somebody to arouse more enthusiasm among the students, and that the teams should come in earlier under somebody in authority who would maintain a strict discipline. Sporting Comment

When it comes to football you must hand all the laurels to Hamilton. If you don't they'll take them anyway; so what's the difference?

The annual meeting of the Canadian League will be held at the Prince George Hotel, Toronto, on Friday next, at 2 p.m. President Fitzgerald notified the various clubs to-day.

The western professional hockey lists found that their new outside rule, in which there are no off-sides in centre ice (about one-third of the area), greatly encouraged off-side loafing by the players. This is the great objection to the change and one that will cause its rejection by those interested in the welfare of hockey.

A familiar figure will be missing from the Junior O.H.A. this year. "Rusty" Bell, coach and manager of "Varsity" Juniors, has turned his megaphone out to pasture and will be an ordinary every-day roofer from now on. Varsity-Canoes Club games will not seem the same with the megaphone duel-cut out.

The first hockey game of the season to be played in Ontario will take place on Wednesday evening when the Dunville intermediates will line up in an exhibition game against the Hamilton Hockey Club. It must be held to live in the Ambitious City where there is artificial ice.

Revenge of Boston "Royal Rooters." When the Boston Red Sox were playing for the World's championship in 1912 they had a loyal following of 500 Boston business men called the "Royal Rooters" who went to all the games both in New York and Boston accompanied by bands and color-bearers. In the end and deciding game at the Fenway in Boston the home club, with an insatiable desire to get the coin, sold the seats that had been previously occupied and paid for by the "Royal Rooters."

Just before the game, as was their custom, the "Royal Rooters" paraded around the field until they came to the stand, which was occupied at some of the "phant" stars across the field to the grandstand. Upon the instruction of the club the mounted police drove them back into and under the stand where they were broken up and dispersed most of them being unable to see the game at all.

This incident aroused the greatest hostility in Boston and the surrounding country to the American League Club, and the attendance in 1913 was the smallest on record. Today it is announced that all those concerned in the trouble with the rooters, "Jim" McAleer, Robt. McRoy, and Jack Stahl, have been forced to sell out and get away from Boston, a bad sequel to what looked like a trivial happening at the time.

TO LIFT CUP.

Brooks, Dunlop and Wilding Will Be the Team to Meet Americans. MELBOURNE, Victoria, Dec. 2.—Australia will make another attempt to recover the Dwight F. Davis lawn tennis cup, now held by America. Norman E. Brookes and A. W. Dunlop have booked passage for Europe and will compete in the British and Continental tournaments.

They will thus be able to round up the international tennis team, and Anthony F. Wilding, of New Zealand, who this year defeated Maurice E. McLoughlin of San Francisco, for the championship of Great Britain, announces that he will be available for the Davis Cup contests.

PREMIER SCOTT QUOTED. REGINA, Sask., Dec. 2.—Discussing last Thursday's referendum on direct legislation, Premier Scott said: "Returns are still incomplete and I do not care to commit myself until the total vote cast is returned. However, I do not think the government would be justified in considering the vote cast Thursday as a full expression of the voters of the province in favor of direct legislation. But at the present time I will not make a definite statement as to the policy we intend to pursue. The future of the measure is in the hands of its friends who must now make the first move to rehabilitate it." F. M. Bee, a prominent member of the Direct Legislation League, said that the league hopes to get a measure submitted again at the next general election. If that can be done he is sure it will carry.

RUSSELL FORD MAY GO TO CLEVELAND

Naps to Give Kahler and Youngster for New Yorker.

CLEVELAND, Dec. 2.—Russell Ford, for several years one of the most effective pitchers in the American League, may be found in a Cleveland uniform next season. A deal is pending which will give Chance George Kahler and one of the Nap youngsters in exchange for the famous spittal artist.

Ford has not been a world beater in the last two years, but, although handicapped by being compelled to pitch for an unusually poor team at times, his slow motion ball, which has made him one of the American League's best pitchers.

President Somers, of the Naps, is seeking two pitchers and an outfielder. Russell Ford is a right-hander and a spitter. Somers and Birmingham think he will be a winner if added to the Naps' staff. With a gang of swatsmen behind him like Birmy's boys, it is figured Ford would win as many games as he did in the days when the Yankees were a fast team.

Kahler, who is mentioned in connection with the deal for Ford, had all the armaments of making a great pitcher when he first came out from the minors. But he has not improved to any extent. Until six weeks before the last season closed Kahler did not have anything which resembled a curve ball. After he had added the twist to his pitching repertoire, Manager Birmingham gave him another chance to show what he could do against real batters. George failed to make a favorable impression with the fans.

Kahler is weak with men on the bases. He seems able to go very well until a man reaches first, then when he is forced to cut out his swing he loses effectiveness.

GARMENT WORKER SHOT. PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 2.—A garment worker on his way to work yesterday was shot, probably fatally, by an unidentified man who fired from the window of a taxicab. The wounded man is Harry Skulnick, who with four other garment workers had been on strike but had returned to work. Skulnick was being escorted by a city detective when a taxicab dashed up and one of the occupants began to shoot. After emptying a revolver the cab sped away. Two suspects who gave New York addresses, but believed to be fictitious, were arrested. The garment workers' strike has been in progress here since last summer.

HUERTA LEAVES SECRETLY. Mexican City, December 2.—Provisional President Huerta is reported to have left the federal capital secretly for Vera Cruz, travelling over the Inter-Oceanic Railroad. The story originates with the railroad officials who claim to know of General Huerta's departure at 4 o'clock in the morning on board a special train. The president of Querido Moheño, the Mexican foreign minister at the port of Vera Cruz, is said to have had connection with the plan of General Huerta to leave the country.

WESTERN LAND ACQUISITIONS. ANY PERSON who is the sole holder of a half acre or any more fraction of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta, and who is not the holder in person at the Dominion Land Agency or Sub-Agency for the District, may, by proxy, apply to the Agency for certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister or outstanding heir.
