KENTVILLE SCHOOLS FAREWELL TO PRINCIPAL SWANSON

On Friday, March 30th, at the beginning of the afternoon session, Mr. Swanson was surprised by a general assembly of the High School in his class room and the following address was read by Hubert Lyons:
To Principal P. Swanson,
Kings County Academy,
Kentville, Nova Scotia.

Dear Teacher and Friend:
It is with mingled feelings of regret and pride that your Academy pupils and assistant teachers address you on this occasion in the old building where we have spent so many busy and pleasant hours together.

We deeply regret that the close, intimate, and, above all, friendly intercourse that has so long and happily subsisted between us, has now to terminate, for a time at least,—and we are proud that with self-sacrificing patriotism you are about to take up arms in defence of the liberties and honor of your County in her hour of peril.

We shall always remember, may we can never forget, that alike in the discipline of the class-room and the relaxation of the playground, you have been the constant and reliable "guide, philosopher and friend" of your pupils as we are proud to call ourselves, and in this hour we appreciate more than ever, that your influence has been an influence for good and uplifting. Your patient and unwearied care in assisting us with our studies and helping us over difficulties, not less than your cheerful presence, and the hearty way in which you took part in our sports and pastimes have endeared you to us in a way that we find difficult to express in fitting terms.

We shall watch and follow your career Overseas with the warmest interest, being well assured that no truer or braver heart will beat under the Kings uniform than the stout heart of Private Pat Swanson, soon to be of the 245th Canadian Grenadier Guards.

We beg you to accept this little gift as a small parting expression of our affection, good will and regard, and praying that you may have a successful overseas career, and a speedy, safe and victorious return, your Academy pupils now wish you Good-bye and God-speed.

At the conclusion of the address Hilda Kinsman presented Mr. Swanson with an engraved wrist watch and purse of gold.

Just as Mr. Swanson had finished some appropriate remarks, he was called to the Grade II Room, where all the teachers and pupils of the common grades had gathered to do honor to their popular principal. As he entered the room he was greeted with hearty cheers. He was then presented with a fountain pen and a purse of gold by Forest Walsh and Yuliah Dennison read the following address:

Dear Mr. Swanson, Teacher and Friend:
In consideration of your kindness and interest you have shown in our welfare, also the high esteem in which we regard you for heeding the call of our Country we present to you, as a remembrance, this little token of our appreciation of service rendered to us.

After Mr. Swanson's reply in words befitting the occasion several patriotic songs were sung and thus concluded Mr. Swanson's eight years connection with the Academy.

OBITUARY CHARLES H. REID

The death of Mr. Charles H. Reid of Avonport, occurred at his home on March 28th. Mr. Reid was the oldest resident of Avonport having attained the ripe age of eighty-seven years. He was a Baptist in faith and was a consistent and loyal church member throughout his long life. He was a man who was much loved and trusted in the community, and in all his business and social relations was held in the highest esteem by all. Until recently Mr. Reid enjoyed good health considering his age. But repeated attacks of illness during the last ten years continued to reduce his strong physical vigor till a few weeks ago it was seen that the end was near. The funeral service was held at the residence on Sunday afternoon, and was largely attended.
