COLONEL PARSONS RETURNS

Lieut. Col. N. H. Parsons, who landed recently at Quebec arrived at his home in Wolfville last Tuesday evening and was in Kentville on Wednesday. He was looking remarkably well. He has been while overseas, the second in command of a large training camp for finishing men for duty just before they are sent to France to enter the trenches and he has had strenuous work. He returns home to await other duties. He has the proud distinction of being one lieutenant colonel who offered to revert to the rank of lieutenant in order to get into the firing line.

DOMINION ELECTION HELD ON DECEMBER 17TH

Nomination Day is set for Monday, November 19th.

OTTAWA, Oct. 31—Writs were issued tonight calling for a general election on Monday, December 17th. Nomination day is fixed for Monday, November 19th. This applies to all constituencies except the Yukon territory. In Yukon nomination day will be December 31st and polling day four weeks later, Monday, January 28th. All writs are returnable on February 27th, 1918. Parliament is summoned to meet on the day following.

The election will be without a parallel in the history of the Dominion. The granting of the franchise to soldiers and sailors and their female relatives at home has entailed the creation of entirely new machinery Military and naval polls will have to be held in France, Belgium, the United Kingdom, the West Indies, Canada and on the high seas.

In every polling sub-division in the Dominion an enumerator will immediately have to set to work revising the electoral lists. The names of enfranchised female relatives of soldiers will have to be added. The name of aliens disfranchised by the war time elections act will have to be deleted.

Roughly, 20,000 enumerators will be required. Military voters stationed in Canada will cast their votes on the same day as civilian electors. But the difficulties of an election day at the front have made changes necessary.

All soldiers overseas will begin voting on November 20th and military votes may be cast up to and including the ordinary polling day. There will necessarily be delay also in the counting of military votes. Military votes cast in France and Belgium will be counted at the office of the Canadian commission in Paris; those cast in the United Kingdom will be counted at the office of the Canadian high commissioner in London. Military votes cast in Bermuda and Canada will be counted under the supervision of the general returning officer at Ottawa, W. F. O'Connor. It is anticipated that about five weeks will elapse between polling day and final announcement by the general returning

officer as to the final results in all electoral districts.

The new house of commons will consist of 234 members, as compared with 221 in the last parliament.

URGE AMERICA TO

WAR ON AUSTRIA

New York, Oct. 31—President Wilson was urged today in a special session of Congress to declare war on Austria. A resolution adopted by the House of Representatives of the American Defense Society at a special meeting here today.

The resolution further urges the transportation to Italy of a contingent of American troops and war material, using all ships possible including seized Austrian ships for the purpose. It sets forth that the complete defeat of Italy's armies will endanger her national existence and imperil the issue of the war for democracy.

And that to preserve Italy's existence and to maintain her efficiency as a fighting force, immediate moral, military and economic aid from her Allies is imperative.

THE "SUB" SINKINGS

London, October 31—Fourteen British merchantmen over 1000 tons were sunk by mine or submarine in the past week, according to the Admiralty report tonight. Four vessels under 1000 tons were also sunk, but no fishing craft were sunk.

AMERICANS READY TO GO "OVER THE TOP"

With the American Army in France, October 31—(By the Associated Press)—Conditions in the sector in which the Americans are stationed were normal today. The artillery work continued. The weather was showery and much colder. For the last two days there has been considerable aerial observation. Late yesterday three German planes flew over the American trenches.

"So great is the enthusiasm among the Americans to go on patrol that the French commander has ordered that none of the higher grade officers perform other than their regular duties. It is the duty of the junior commissioned officers and the non-commissioned officers to go with patrols but the officers of higher rank, such as majors, were anxious to go out.

"The quartermaster now has supplies for several days within reach of the American position as a precaution against any transportation difficulties with the bases."

RAID ON LONDON

Thirty Airships Took Part, Three of Them Penetrating to the Heart of London—Casualties and Damage Slight

London, November 1—About thirty airships, in seven groups, took part in last night's air raid. Three of them penetrated to the heart of London, says an official report today. The casualties and damage were slight.

A report from Lord French, commander of the home defences, respecting last night's air raid, says the German aviators took advantage of the clouds to prevent any decisive engagements.

On Saturday morning Mr. George Davis of Gaspeau died very suddenly at Wolfville station where he had come to unload apples.
