INDUSTRIAL ACCIDENTS

OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—There were 491 industrial accidents recorded by the department of labor during January, of which 100 were fatal and 391 resulted in serious injuries. Compared with the record for December, the above is an increase of three fatal and 34 non-fatal accidents. The figures for January, 1912, were 103 fatal and 531 non-fatal accidents. The greater number of fatalities were recorded under the headings of mining and railway service.

TO POWERS

It is Now Said That Roumania and Bulgaria are Willing to Submit Final Adjustment of War

The operations at Tschatalja and in Gallipoli since the reopening of the war have been indecisive. Men have died by hundreds on both sides, but the positions of the belligerents remain unaffected.

Married Women Who Own Property May be Given the Vote in Ontario

TORONTO, Feb. 20.—During the consideration of the reconstructed Ontario Municipal Act in the Legislature Hon. W. J. Hanna made a statement that a law would likely be enacted at this session providing for the extension of the municipal franchise to married women who own property.

The newly revised act was under consideration clause by clause, in committee of the whole House prior to the second reading. The amended section relating to those qualified to vote did not contain a clause that married women owning property would be given the municipal franchise. J. C. Elliott, Liberal member for West Middlesex, stated that the clause should be amended with a provision giving married women, who own property, the right to take part in elections. Mr. Hanna replied that the law as it now stands was not consistent with regard to married women property owners, as at the present time a woman could vote for school trustee in cities, but not for alderman or mayor.
