OUR CONTEMPORARY.

MR. BORDEN'S CREED.

In his Winnipeg speech, Mr. Borden, leader of the Liberal-Conservative party, thus stated his political creed: "I do not believe in sending raw materials to the United States, sending Canadians after them to work in United States factories, and then sending good Canadian money to buy the goods made by Canadians from Canadian material in the United States. I believe in the development of industries along legitimate lines, and developing the coal of Nova Scotia, the lumber of British Columbia, the fisheries, the lead mines, as well as the great agricultural industries of these western plains, and only by a policy of this kind can we build up a great nation."

END OF THE COAL STRIKE.

The struggle of the anthracite coal operators for recognition of their union and the amelioration of the conditions of labor in the mines has terminated in their triumph over the forces of monopoly. For five long months 147,000 workmen maintained a dubious fight against the operators through the assistance of their fellow union men, who contributed liberally of their means to support the strikers and their families, the principle at stake being the vital issue of the right of workmen to combine for their common interests. And it is this feature of the outcome which will probably be regarded by them as the most important point gained by the miners. But perhaps more significant still, because more pregnant of beneficent possibilities, is the recognition of the sound principle of arbitration. It would be unreasonable to suppose that this lesson of the great strike will be lost, or that the humane and honorable means which have brought it to a termination, will not form a precedent in the settlement of important industrial disturbances in the future. At all events we need never look for a repetition of the autocratic attitude of capitalists in spurning an offer of arbitration where the ample production of one of the prime necessities of life is involved. The operators have learned this lesson at least, that there is a danger line in dealing arbitrarily with public interests beyond which it is unsafe to venture. This was tacitly acknowledged by the president of the Ontario and Western railway, who when asked what led the operators to make their final offer of arbitration, said:—

It was chiefly due to the pressure of public opinion or rather you might say public necessity. We recognized that the public would suffer from scarcity of coal if something were not done soon, and we concluded that it would be honorable to overlook in a measure the rights of the interests we represent in order that a way out of a serious predicament might be found. In accepting this statement of the case, however, people will be constrained to ask why the mine owners

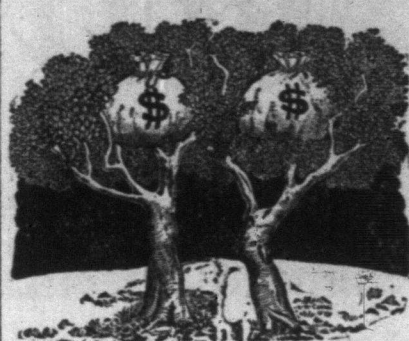

OVERHEATED HOUSES.

One lesson worth learning is that running furnaces full tilt from the 15th of September to the 15th of April is a silly waste of fuel and a detriment to health. Our weather-wise friends of the postoffice would say, if you asked them, that the thermometer does not drop nearly so far or stay down nearly so long, as people have got into the habit of imagining. Last year there were in October just 50 days when it was colder than 50 degrees, while November had twelve days warmer than 40 degrees, and December had nine days warmer than 40 degrees. In 1900 October had five days colder than 30, and December, thirteen days when it was warmer than 40. It seems cold when there is snow, but on many days a hot fire in the kitchen range, with perhaps an oil or the gas stove in one of the living rooms for a time, will take off the chill amply.

Physicians say our houses are kept too hot and close. We go over-heated into the colder air, take colds and pneumonia. We bundle up to avert this, and weaken our throats and lungs with pampering. We sit breathing foul, hot air, which breeds bacteria. Most families, say the learned, be the health of their children, keep their houses cooler in winter.
