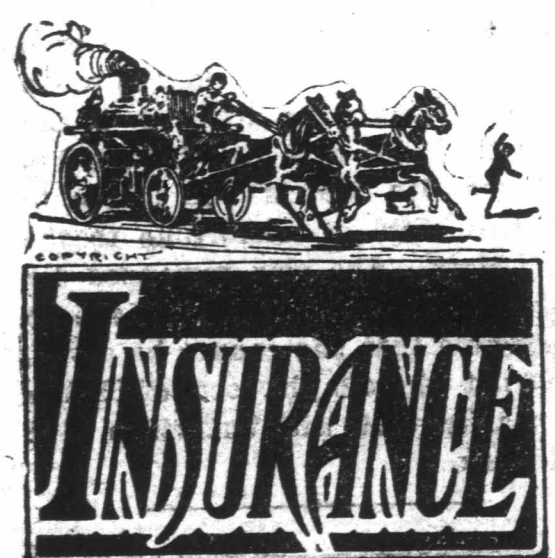

Hun Attacks Are Weaker

FRENCH FRONT IN FRANCE, July 2.—(To the Associated Press)—The Germans succeeded in occupying today the French front line trenches a third of a mile in length east of Cerny and north of Chemin-Des-Dames. This local success was followed by a military view point followed a terrific artillery bombardment at the beginning of which the French abandoned the line of trenches which were flattened out. This forward step leaves the Germans still without their coveted observation posts. Apparently there was little backbone in the attack as the success was not followed up. The same lack of push characterized all the German attacks recently along a line stretching from eastward of Soissons to Verdun. Evidently the enemy after his recent defeat in the Champagne feels the need of local successes to encourage the men who, according to prisoners, are greatly depressed. It is comparatively easy for them to concentrate many heavy guns at any given point and thus drive the French out of small sectors. Hitherto, however, whenever the Germans attacked with their specially selected troops they did not penetrate any depth all their attempts to do something meet with energetic resistance and are usually being followed by the French counter-attacks. The German occupants of demolished positions sustained great losses.

GREECE'S ATTITUDE KNOWN IN BERLIN

AMSTERDAM, July 2.—According to the North German Gazette, the Greek Charge D'Affairs at Berlin has handed the German Government a statement notifying the Foreign Office that Greece had felt herself obliged to break off diplomatic relations with Germany.

NO PROMOTION FOR CENSURED PERSONS

LONDON, July 2.—In the Commons today the Government leader, Bonar Law, gave the assurance that pending the discussion of the Mesopotamia report no person censured by the Commission would be promoted to a higher position than he now holds. He added that there was not at the present time or never had been any intention of transferring Lord Hardinge, the former Viceroy of India, to the Paris Embassy, or to any other diplomatic post.

Americans on French Soil

LONDON, July 2.—Lord Derby, Secretary of War in a statement to the Associated Press today, said the arrival in France of the Troops of the United States to take their place by the side of French, Belgian and British troops, is an event of first importance. The moral effect of this reinforcement will be far-reaching as the accession of the great army of which this is the vanguard, enthusiastic for restoration of peace and liberty throughout the world will be welcome to all fighting for the sacred cause on French and Belgian soil. The promptitude with which our kinsmen across the Atlantic have given effect to their pledges of co-operation is no surprise to us who know their energy and resourcefulness, but is an earnest of their determination to hasten the victory which will reward our united efforts and therefore moves us deeply.

STATEMENT PRECEDING THE RUPTURE OF DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS

VIENNA, July 2.—Rupture of diplomatic relations between Greece and Austria-Hungary was preceded by a statement which the Greek Minister at Vienna handed the Foreign Minister on Saturday. The statement reads: "Now that unity has been restored between the two parties which have hitherto divided Greece in two camps and the Greek troops are fighting on the Macedonian front the Government of Greece sees itself obliged to break diplomatic relations."

RUSSIA'S NEW OFFENSIVE

PETROGRAD, July 2.—Russia's first offensive under the new regime was continued vigorously today; artillery fire of great intensity was reported in the official War Office statement, in the direction of Zolotchow and Brezany, Galicia.

LOSS OF GREEK DESTROYER DOXA

PARIS, July 2.—The Greek destroyer Doxa, manned by French Officers and crew, has been blown up in the Mediterranean, twenty-nine men including all the officers, were lost. An official announcement of the loss of the Doxa says that the destroyer sank as the result of a double explosion on June 28th. The Doxa was then within 100 yards of a merchant vessel which she was convoying.

EX-KING CONSTANTINE

ST. MORITZ, July 2. (delayed)—Ex-King Constantine of Greece and his family and suite arrived here today. The Dowager Queen, Sophia, appeared still to be in poor health. The party were received at the station by the local authorities and escorted to the hotel where rooms had been reserved.

TOBACCO TAX REDUCED

LONDON, July 2.—Discussing the Finance Bill in the House of Commons today, Andrew Bonar Law announced from July 16 the increased tax on tobacco instead of 22 pence as proposed in the Budget, would be only eleven pence.

CANADA IS CONGRATULATED ON CONFEDERATION JUBILEE

OTTAWA, July 2.—The following message of congratulation on the event of the Confederation was received on behalf of Canada by the Governor-General from Premier Lloyd George. Fifty years ago the statesmen of the provinces of Canada gathered in convention in Quebec to work out the basis of the Federal Union. From that act of statesmanship the Dominion of Canada was born. Confederation has done much for Canada. It has enabled the Canadian people to internal unity and self-government and to achieve the benefit development of the resources of their country. It has done no less for the Empire. It has made Canada the pioneer of that autonomous nationhood which is the unique characteristic of our Commonwealth of nations, and it has had its logical outcome in the imperishable record which the army of Canada has made on the battlefields of Flanders in the cause of human freedom. History of the past fifty years is indeed certain proof of the part which Canada is destined to play in concert with her sister nations in promoting the peace and unity of the world after victory has been won.
