SEALING DISASTER ANNIVERSARY

Eight years ago to-day a storm which brought in its wake tragedy for Newfoundland, swept over the ice floes catching many herd sealers away from their ships and sending many of them to an awful death on that limitless waste which our men tread in the effort to eke out a precarious living.

On the morning of March 31st, 1914, the crews of many of the steamers got on the ice as usual but before long they were picked up by their captains who had been warned of the impending storm by a suddenly falling glass.

The Newfoundland crew had wandered farther afield than others and when the light falling snow, which later developed into a blizzard, overtook them they boarded the Floriz but left her again to return to their own ship. Many of them never got back. The storm enveloped them, blinded them and caused them to stray from the proper course. After a night of awful agony and death on the wind and snow swept icefields, morning broke on a scene of indescribable desolation and disaster. Nearly a hundred of Newfoundland's bravest and best had "sculptured their last tow."

The same week the Southern Cross was lost with all hands while crossing St. Mary's Bay coming in from the Gulf with a full load, and thus in one spring did the sealfishery take a toll of nearly three hundred men from the ranks of the country's bread winners.

Newfoundland Should Raise Her Own Food

LITERARY INSTITUTE OF OPINION THAT WE COULD PRODUCE ADEQUATE SUPPLIES. Can adequate food supplies be produced within Newfoundland?—is the question the self-subsisting in food? Methodist College Literary Institute is of opinion that she can, or at least night's debate the vote was very much in favor of the affirmative side. The sides were led by: A. E. Parsons, R. Hecker and J. R. Smallwood (substituted) affirmative; and R. Cram and Joseph Moore, negative. Beside the set speakers the following members took part from the floor: A. E. Hayward, W. H. Peters, E. Bursey, Fred Moore, William Drover and Wm. White. The majority for the affirmative was two to one.

By food supplies the affirmative meant those articles of food which were essential, the fundamental articles of food. They did not claim that Newfoundland could grow oranges and grapes and coffee, for instance. We could, and in fact already did grow ninety per cent. of the agricultural products which we consume, with the obvious exception of wheat. We could grow more than ninety per cent. however, and more than 100 per cent. This country could support, agriculturally, a population twice or thrice as big as the present. Only the shores of the country are inhabited. The soil at present is cultivated in a higgledy, stinky way, along the seaboard. The thousands of acres of land in the from the shores are lying fallow, unproductive because they are not cultivated. It is remarkable that, with our primitive methods, we produce so much now. With intelligent methods and earnest attention this country could grow very much more than she grows now.

It was possible to grow wheat in Newfoundland. A hardy type of grain had been evolved to suit this climate, just as it suited the climate of Northern Siberia and Canada. We could even produce our own sugar, by making it from beet. In fact, with the exception of certain articles not absolutely necessary, the country could support herself. Negative. The negative side claimed by all the tokens Newfoundland was a fishing country, and would remain a fishing country. Geographically and temperamentally we were a fishing people and not a farming people. In any case, contended the negative, what was meant by "adequate food supplies" was not only what people could get along with but what they ordinarily used, whether they could do without it or not. Such articles of food as fruits, spices, peas, rice, tea, coffee, molasses, etc., could not be produced in the country. The negative doubted that either wheat or sugar could be produced in Newfoundland. To produce 14,000,000 pounds of sugar annually would take a lot of beet! And yet that was the amount this country imported every year. Newfoundland imported roughly 400,000 barrels of flour. Could the country produce annually that much grain? The native doubted it very much.

The affirmative side had told of the tons hay and oat crops which Newfoundland produced. But the negative had to hear that the people of Newfoundland would eat hay or oats! There was one thing that could be done to make it possible for Newfoundland to grow her own food supplies, suggested the negative, and that was to dam off the Straits of Bell Is and make a Florida of the country! Mr. A. J. Bayly, Secretary of the Agricultural Board, who was present, was invited by the Institute to express himself. Mr. Bayly told the institute some very interesting facts concerning the present agricultural activities of the country.

Lectured at Lewellyn Club

Lewellyn Club held another of its social meetings last night. Many members attended together with their lady friends. Rev. E. C. Harp presided. Mrs. Frank Warren contributed a song, after which the President introduced Sir Patrick McGrath, K.B.E. Sir Patrick gave a very interesting account of the trip across Canada of the members of the Imperial Press Conference on which Newfoundland was represented by Dr. Mosdell, Hon. A. Mews and himself. The address was illustrated by views taken by members of the Conference, which have been reproduced in natural colors by officials of the Canadian Department of the Interior. The trip, extended from Sydney, N.S., to Vancouver, B.C., and the press representatives visited not only the important cities of the Dominion but many of the smaller towns and country places. In this way they obtained a better idea of Canadian resources than most tourists can get. Sir Patrick met several former residents of Newfoundland, among them the millionaire tobacco manufacturer, MacDonaid, who has built and endowed the Agricultural College at St. Anne de Bellevue, and who once lived in St. John's. The pictures showed not only great industrial plants, mammoth hotels and palatial parliament buildings, but the audience were also treated to views of the home of Evangeline in the East Indians and buffaloes on the Western plains, giant logs in the forests of British Columbia and lovely bits of scenery in all the Provinces. A hearty vote of thanks was accorded the lecturer and the hope expressed that Sir Patrick would come again. The lecture will well be repeated.
