Local News.

The Public School teachers received their pay to-day.

The Maple Leafs play exhibition games in Rochester on Monday and Tuesday with the Hop Bitsers Club.

New Stage.—A new stage has been placed on the line between Guelph and Hamilton.

LARCENIES.—On Thursday night a horse and covered buggy were stolen from Walter Bryden, of New Dundee. The same night, a deer and wagon was stolen from Andrew Wilkie, Ferguson.

The Dog Be-Law.—The new dog by-law is now in force. Persons who do not conform with its requirements will be prosecuted if detected. The fine will in all likelihood amount to more than the cost of a dog check.

The Rev. J. B. Robinson, successor to Rev. H. Harris, arrived in the city on Wednesday, with his wife and family. He has taken up his residence at the parsonage on Paisley street, and will occupy the pulpit of the P. M. Church on Sunday.

The Review.—The leading event at London on Dominion Day was the review and sham battle of the volunteers, about 1,500 participating. A large crowd of spectators were present to witness the evolutions, which were carried out in a creditable manner.

FALL OF MILL FLOORS.—About 7 o'clock on Wednesday evening three car loads of wheat on the top floor of Messrs. A. & W. Felton, millers, Waterloo Road, burst the floor, and on its way down carried away the other floors, destroying a part of the machinery. The loss is estimated about \$300 and \$400. The workmen had a narrow escape, having left the floors a minute or two previous.

RAIN BURN.—During the heavy thunder storm which passed over Eramosa on noon on Wednesday, the lightning struck the barn of Mr. John Brees, on the 2nd con. He immediately rushed out and found the whole place in flames and was unable to save anything. His loss is serious, consisting of a span of horses, about twenty tons of hay, waggon, reaper and other farm implements, besides, in fact everything that was in the barn and stables. We understand he is insured in a Hamilton Company but we cannot tell for how much.

BURGLARY AT GORBOCK.—The residence and post office store of Mr. T. D. Thomas, Gorcock, were burglarized between 12.30 and 2.30 o'clock on Thursday morning. The burglars gained access to the house by breaking one of the back windows. They entered the bedroom of Mr. Thomas and abstracted from his clothes \$95 and the key of the store door. They went to the store making an easy entrance by means of the key they had stolen, and removed from the till \$15 in silver and \$3 in coppers. They were evidently after money alone, as no attempt had been made to take any of the goods. The family did not retire till about 12.30 and the robbery was discovered two hours later, when Mrs. Thomas rose to get a drink for her child, and found Mr. Thomas' clothes on the step of the back door with the keys lying beside them. No clue has been obtained as to who the burglars were.

RETURN OF THE 30TH BATTALION.—On Tuesday evening the 30th battalion received orders to strike their tents (Friday) morning and start for home. The men were astir at 4.30 this morning preparing for their departure, and before seven o'clock all was in readiness for the journey. It was found impossible to remove the tents which were soaking wet after a heavy rain on Thursday night, and they were left standing and will be sent on in a few days. The battalion marched to the station headed by the band and embarked on a special train at 7.30. There were no incidents of any moment on the way to this city, which was reached at twelve o'clock. The Guelph and Eramosa companies got off here. The band played a few selections after which cheering was in order. The Guelph and Eramosa companies then marched into the city and were dismissed. They spent a pleasant time at London, and were greatly benefited by the drill received while in camp.
