Ocean Limited Bandits Have Been Caught

Quebec, Que., Sept. 22—After five days of incessant work during which every possible clue was followed to the limit practically every place in the province of Quebec was combed fine, the police operated four arrests in the city of Quebec today and believe they have captured the bandits who figured in the hold-up and rifled the mail car on the Ocean Limited train between Levis and Montmagny on the morning of Thursday Sept. 18th. The men arrested are George Topping a freight conductor on the Canadian National Railways, and C. Bonardin, T. Proteau, a former garage owner, who disguised with masks and carrying revolvers entered the mail car and after binding the hands and feet of the five mail clerks, ransacked the mail and got away with \$1700 in five and ten dollar notes. The other two men arrested, who are held as material witnesses are George Lavasseur, a brother-in-law of Topping, and Napoleon Boulanger of Levis.
While the police have not yet located the missing pony, they hope to be able to do so in a very short time, and in the meantime, they have the masks used by the bandits when they made their haul.
While the operations of the police since the hold-up seemed to be concentrated in the rural districts and along the American line, they were neglecting nothing in Quebec and Levis and the fact that the four arrests were operated in Quebec today indicates that their operations had narrowed down to a small area within the past few days.
The first arrests made today were those of George Lavasseur and Napoleon Boulanger, the former is a mechanic in the employ of the Gosse firm at Levis. Both were arrested in Quebec, the former on St. Joseph street, and the latter as he was entering the Quebec post office.
While these two men had some connection with the crime, it is understood that they turned King's evidence and as a result are merely held as witnesses in the case for the present.

PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS STOOD TEST OF FIRE
Ottawa, Sept. 23—The new parliamentary buildings were the scene of a fire tonight, and but for the fireproof construction a conflagration such as that of February 1916 might have ensued. The blaze occurred in an inside room in the basement among some boxes containing asbestos and the firemen had to drag their hose through corridors, etc. etc. in order to reach the fire. The damage to property was about \$2,000.

Historical Society Of Gaspesia

That part of New Brunswick from the Miramichi to the Gulf of St. Lawrence and from the coast to the Riviere Aux Saumons near Levis comprised the ancient territory of the government of Gaspesia, which was hereditary in the family of Nicolas Denys, descendant of the captain Jehan Denys who took possession of all this country in 1604 and published a chart of the same at Honfleur in 1608. This region is one of the most historic of America. Besides being Nicolas Denys's residence, as while hereditary lord, or prince, of the district while governor of Acadia and Newfoundland from 1654 to 1669 when he wrote his Histoire de L'Amérique, it was the anchorage of the celebrated privateer Le Griffon (Anse du Griffon) in 1732. It was in this district that Aubert de Gaspé wrote his celebrated book, "Les Anciens Canadiens." These are but a few of the interesting things whose account ought to be gathered together and other things done for the advancement of the district. The pre-

sent Comte de La Gaspésie has consented to be the Honorary-President of the newly formed Historical Society of Gaspesia and it is expected that the Hon. Rudolph Lemieux will be the President. It is proposed to divide the Society up into as many branches, at the head of each being a vice-president, as there are countries, or Seigneuries, in the district. Each one of these branches will choose its own historian and other officers to gather the historical data of its particular locality. Each branch will meet monthly to hear reports, communications, etc. The families of the noblesse, French and British, in genealogical value will have representation in the registries of the Society. The clergy should represent their parishes, and the landed proprietors, merchants and professions should represent their historical belongings etc.
Communication has been opened with the city of Honfleur to obtain historical memorials of the great discoverer, Denys, the Norman, which will be kept at the chief town in the

district (probably Newcastle), where a valuable library from historical interchanges will be open to the public, if the town will provide the quarters necessary for the library room.
The membership fee of \$2.00 per year will entitle each member to the diploma of the society, to the Society's publications and to other privileges.
The organization of the local branch at Newcastle ought to commence at once. Those interested are to communicate either with Comte de La Gaspésie, 128 Canvass St. Cohoes, State of New York, or with the Sec'y of the Society, College of Arms, Archives Department, Ottawa, Canada
