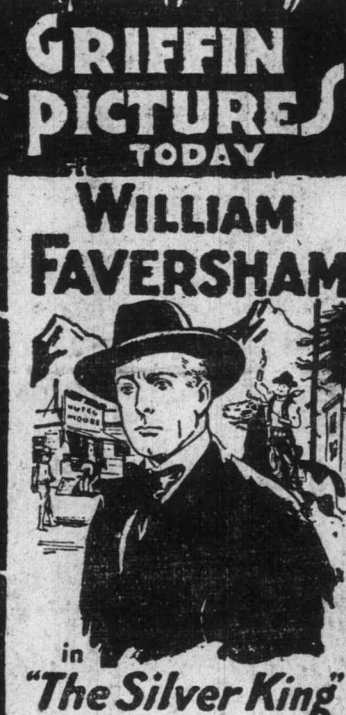
not known since the golden days of burnt cork stage fun during and right after the Civil War. The Hill novelty is due at the Grand Opera House on Thursday night next.

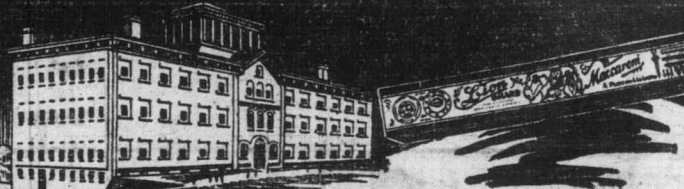
