A Question for the People.

THE WRIT for the election of a Member to serve in the Legislative Council in the place of the late...

The question which the Electors have to decide at the approaching contest is, by no means, a difficult one...

The present Government have reduced the annual expenditure from \$390,000 which it was in 1873, the last year of the Davies Administration...

In what way has this reduction been effected? Has the amount expended for Education been reduced?

Has the amount expended for the care and maintenance of the afflicted and poor been reduced? No, but it has largely increased.

How does the expenditure upon Roads, Bridges and Ferries compare with that of the Davies Government in liberality? We find that in 1873 the Government expended \$39,000 on Roads...

But if the expenditure in all these branches has so largely increased, where have the deductions been made?

One of the first acts of the present Government upon coming into power was to reduce the salaries of the heads of departments by \$300 each...

Other reductions were also made, notably in the expense of the Legislature, which has been reduced by \$6,000 annually.

Davies-Stewart regime, cost \$62,000, an average of \$31,000 a year. In the six years from 1873 to 1878, the same service cost \$120,923, or an average of \$20,154 a year...

Legislation in the years 1877 and 1878 cost \$35,757, an average of \$17,878 a year. For the last six years the expenditure was \$80,392, or an average of \$13,398 a year...

The Administration of the Public Works Department, by which we mean the salaries of the Commissioner, the Secretary, the Engineer, the Supervisors, and the printing and stationery, cost in the years 1877 and 1878, \$22,688, an average of \$11,344 a year...

For the years 1877 and 1878, the expenses of the Executive Council and Auditor's Office were \$8,000, an average of \$4,000 a year; for the last six years the cost was \$13,000, an average of \$2,166 a year...

But the worst feature of the whole affair was that, in the face of this indebtedness, there was not a cent in the treasury to pay it with.

With this indebtedness of \$120,000, the greater part of which had to be met in 1879, it is not surprising that even with the aid of the assessment, the new administration were \$28,000 behind at the end of the year...
